

# Stirring of Human Spirit

Few things in life are more fascinating and infuriating than trying to figure out where human effort meets divine intervention. Look at the apostles of today's gospel. There is an unexplained immediacy in their response to God's bidding them to drop everything and follow Him. There is no indication whatever of what they contributed to the startling scene. Why them and not the many others who had no such reaction to his appeal?

Today, "callings" to priesthood or religious life find a like infrequency of response. Numerous reasons for this are offered. Life has become frivolous and wanting thought, modern innovations of TV, phone, computers have left us no time for communication with our inner selves; there are too many alternative attractions and possibilities available to young aspiring life than ever before, etc. But then again, life was never short of alternative attractions and alluring possibilities. Besides, modern living is invaded by a restlessness that knows that the really real lies beyond what we chose to call real today. We live in a disturbance that assures us that once we ignore divine intervention, we are doomed to enduring unsatisfying longing.

The call of God – not primarily given to a few chosen apostles but to all followers of Christ – will not be dictated by human circumstances and considerations. It is a mysterious stirring of the human spirit, available to us all in God's good time. May the history of our Church and the lives of those gone before us convince us that grace still abounds, that God loves us and that the best is yet to come.

# Interruptions and Interventions

e all write narratives about our lives, but no matter how much we determine and manage our life stories, there are moments when something or someone interrupts, even alters, the narrative. We might find ourselves confused, disorientated, angry, frustrated, and disappointed. We ask, "Why?", "What should I do now?"

I'd like to suggest that there are better questions to ask as people of faith. "Where is God in this disruption, this intervention?" "What is God asking of me?" "Could God be inviting me to let go and to let him take over my life?"

Today's gospel passage of Jesus calling his disciples is an interruption. Here are Peter and Andrew, James and John living their narratives as fishermen. Jesus calls

them to follow him to an unknown future. All he promises is that he will make them fishers of men. Jesus' promise is about transformation – about making their lives something more than their everyday existence. His is a promise of how God wishes to write their life stories, as only God can, and not as humankind plans with self-centered agendas. God's extraordinary narrative for us is to be in friendship with Jesus as his disciples.

Calling the discipes to this new way of life is Jesus' invitation to let God bring out the best in their lives. Jesus will teach them to practice faith, generosity, courage and love for others through lives of service; to live as disciples so that they can experience the Good News he proclaims, which they can then share with others.

Perhaps, we are more aware of God when he intervenes and makes a difference in our lives. Like when God made right our bad decisions and gave us hope again. When God blessed us with a new lease of life after an "incurable" illness. When God gifted us with another's love when we had judged ourselves unworthy of being loved.

Today's gospel passage offers us this hope: God will definitely interrupt our lives to write, even to rewrite, our narratives because he wants to make them greater than we can with our limited human effort.

We can only receive and enjoy this gift if we surrender ourselves to the interruptions and interventions God will make into our everyday life of studying amd working, praying and playing, living and loving. Only then will we see how Jesus is God's light in our lives because it is through, with and in Jesus that God continues to lovingly write our life stories according to his original script.



# In a Garden Centre

I was at the doors of a large garden centre just as they opened and I filled three huge flat-bed trolleys with bedding plants for a courtyard garden I tend at the Cancer Hospital. Getting to the checkout was tricky (haven't all trolleys a mind of their own!) until a kind gentleman lent his assistance. "Large garden you must have!" he said. I explained my mission and, lo and behold, he was the manager. He knocked 10% off the bill and had a young lad help me load everything into the car.

En route with my plants, I had planned a detour past a friend's house to post a small package through the front door so as not to disturb the household. But she was in her car and about to collect her daughter's wedding dress. My friend jumped out, It was Good Friday, and I was workopened the front door and we had a lively chat over a cup of coffee - mostly about

wedding preparations.

# In a Hot-Cross bun

ing in a very poor country. I really did not know where my next meal was coming from but I had bought six hot-cross buns (on the black market) to eat after the afternoon service. When I had locked up the church and put the kettle on, there was a ring on the doorbell and an Indian lady was asking if I had any food for her family. They had walked several hours through the jungle to get to the

service and now had to walk several hours to get back. "How many are you?" I asked. "Six," she said. I suppressed the thought of lying to her, muttered "Thank you very much, God!" under my breath, and gave her the six hot-cross buns. She was absolutely delighted. I sat down with my cup of tea, pondering life. Then there was another ring on the doorbell. This time I was glad that I had nothing to give (except tea); but on the doorstep was a man with a packet of six hot-cross buns. He said, "I thought you might like these, Father."

At the back entrance to the hospital I borrowed an unwieldy hospital laundry trolley onto which I piled the plants and began multiple trips to the courtyard garden down silent corridors. It was a Saturday so I only occasionally met folk going for their radiation treatment. One husband who was accompanying his wife returned to help me, quite unbidden, whilst she was having her treatment.

Planting over a hundred bedding plants in the sun took quite some time and stamina! I hadn't noticed patients passing up and down the corridors under the care of nurses until at one point I turned to find a smiling nurse holding out a cup of tea and a sandwich. It was way into mid-afternoon - I'd missed lunch!

Once home I scrubbed up and put on my Sunday best to get to Vigil Mass. Rather lazily I headed for my car rather than walk the half hour to Church. Flat off-side tyre! Serendipity ... A neighbour was passing and helped me to change it!

Thank you God for a day full of wonder and kindnesses.

# In the Chaos of Everyday Life

**I have** a baby and a toddler who make life a whirlwind of play, chores and caring. Of course, we say daily prayers together as a family before bed when I might say intentions for a sick relative or friend but, what with Sunday mass becoming more like a contact sport than a time for reflection, I have managed to

avoid the deep stuff for some time. I ask myself where on earth can I fit that sort of prayer into my life, and have carried on without seriously seeking a solution.

The other day my husband and I had a big disagreement ... and over a day went by without any resolution. The anger and resentment were so high that we got to the stage where we could no longer look each other in the eye.

Suddenly I needed God, I had

to pray immediately and listen hard. I couldn't wait until the children were settled and in bed, I had to make it work in my normal routine. I grasped at any moment where my mind, at least, was free: feeding the baby for his nap, washing up the dishes, even when

> changing a nappy. My internal dialogue with God continued throughout the day restarting wherever we had left off ... amongst the noise and the mess I heard God's voice.

It took a difficult ¥ and painful experience for me to realise it, but I now know § that I don't always need to escape from life to find God. He is with me throughout my day, from the glorious moments to the most 2 insignificant - I only need to reach out and speak to Him.
