aul speaks of God's choosing us to be holy and blameless in Christ and to be His adopted children.

I find this very attractive, but it also unsettles me somewhat. I look at myself and find myself far from being "holy and blameless": quite to the contrary, I am aware of the ways I have actively hurt people at different stages of my life and with varying degrees of intention. I have also become progressively aware of how much I have hurt others by simply ignoring them, not seeing them and their pains, and not caring that I did not.

When I was younger I would occasionally dream of how I would act if I could go back to my beginnings with the knowledge and strengths which I possessed at that moment. I imagined that I would do everything right and would show great wisdom and compassion, and not walk the crooked path that rarely goes straight towards God, whom I barely dared to claim as my Father. I would think of the values and behaviour that I would most pay attention to, what major and minor choices I would alter, what particular individuals I would approach with special gentleness and attention.

Then one day I realized that all of this was completely beyond my control if I limited myself to the past. It was the me of today which I needed to change, the me that is now, at this moment, with the people whom God has decided to place in my ambit as I am in reality, not in my dream world.

I must turn my eyes more outward, open my ears to the cry of those around me now, know their hungers, and do what I can for each one. Each of them is Christ asking me, "See me, love me, take care of me in these, my true brothers and sisters". Matthew 25:44-45 has Christ's comments about this in terms of the Last Judgement.

This abandonment of self in care for others, this patience and humility and generosity, is our attempt to be attentive and eager children of God; it is our school of purification and love, and as the Spirit cares for these people through us, the presence and care of the Spirit also blesses and heals us as the Spirit uses our human hearts, our minds, and our hands to do the Spirit's work.

And so we do become, slowly and sometimes painfully, "holy and blameless in Christ and His adopted children."

# When can the Rohingya Children Go home?

Jeremy Lim, a volunteer with Jesuit Refugee Service (Singapore), travelled to Bangladesh in May with three parishioners and two representatives from the Archbishop's office to visit the Rohingya refugees

e met Muhusana Begum at the well. Wearing a bright pink dress, she walked barefoot along the muddy paths in between shelters made from bamboo and tarpaulin, carrying a large metal jar that weighs 5kg when filled with water. She pumped the water out of a standing pipe by pushing the lever up and down, making a harsh squeaking noise.

Muhusana is 12 but looks much older, maybe because she has seen more pain and suffering than the average Primary 6 child. Last August, soldiers set fire to her village in the western part of Myanmar. With her parents, brother and six other relatives, she left her home behind and made the long walk to Bangladesh, where they found a place in an ever-growing sea of refugee shelters.

In Kutupalong camp, two hours' drive east of the seaside town of Cox's Bazar, Muhusana's family is safe - for now. The Bangladesh government allows the refugees to stay in specific zones, where Caritas Bangladesh and other NGOs provide food rations such as rice, lentils, sugar, salt and oil. Toilets are a hole in the ground encased in concrete. Children bathe in an open-air pit where every drop of water has to be pumped out by hand.

Although the local Bangladeshis have been generous in helping the refugees, the situation is not sustainable in the long run. Most of the refugees came from farming communities, and lost their fields, cows and chickens when they fled to Bangladesh. They can earn a little pocket money from the UN by

constructing shelters and toilets, but it is not enough to support a family.

Every day, children as young as seven make a long trek to search for firewood. With nearly one million refugees living in the camps, the immediate area has been totally stripped of greenery. Satellite photos show an ever-expanding circle of brown around the shelters, and some reports say that children have to walk up to 10km to find trees that can be cut. Others resort to the dangerous activity of diving into the dust beneath the moving construction machinery to collect tree roots.

There are no schools, so the life of a refugee youth is filled with manual labour. Everywhere, we saw children carrying rocks, bamboo or wood. An enterprising 15-year-old, Jakir Ahmed, was walking from door to door selling clothes and household items. He buys them from a supplier outside the camp and then carries them in two large woven baskets suspended on a long wooden pole.

Ladmire Jakir's can-do spirit, but worry that he has no future in the camp. As long as the refugees do not have a permanent home, they will find it impossible to plan for their children's future. Even the NGO workers on the ground do not know what language to teach the children because they have no idea where they will eventually settle down. Caritas

killed." Ferdinand was upset because he was powerless to replace the child's parents or find a new home for the child.

Although we are still searching for long-term solutions for the children, it is clear how we can help them. Caritas Bangladesh has opened child protection centres that give the children a safe place to play, practise speaking and express themselves through art. These centres keep the children out of trouble and away from gangs and extremists in the camp.
