Responding to Crisis:

"Lord, who shall we go to?"

he media blitz on the clerical scandal in the church in Pennsylvania has once again put the spotlight on the abuses by powerful members of the Catholic Church, who have caused untold pain and suffering to victims and their families, and the church as well.

What is our response? It may be understandable that many of us will be feeling angry, confused, helpless, distressed and shamed. Yes, that can be our initial reactivity with all the emotions above. But when the level of anxiety dissipates, we might take an objective and reflective view to sift and discern where the good spirit is at work as opposed to the bad one that tries to divide, disparage and destroy our faith.

I believe that healthy and open acknowledgement is needed — to name, claim and shame, and tame the problem will be a good starting point. Some may instinctively want to deny such evil crimes and immediately assign blame that it is the "work of the devil" to attack the church. To deny is to bury our heads in the sand. Covering up is not an option. And before we drag the devil into this, it may be necessary to recognize our culpability and responsibility in dealing with this shameful exploitation of innocent children by the brothers and priests, and lay people who colluded with the perpetrators of this crime.

There is no doubt that the leadership failure among bishops, rectors, and religious heads of orders in the church has contributed to the sustained and vicious abuse of children placed under their care and protection in Catholic schools, orphanages and churches. They have failed to provide adequate safeguards, protocols and checks to prevent these abuses of power and sexual depredation.

Existing protocols makes clear that there is no place in the church and its institutions for these criminal offenders, be they priests or lay. In the US, there is the Dallas Charter which takes a tough stand with a zero-tolerance policy against abusers. The law will take its full force

and they will be reported to ensure accountability and responsibility.

The Archdiocese of Singapore has implemented the Professional Standard Office guidelines published in two handbooks *Keeping Communion* and *Restoring Communion*, which can be found online. They have been disseminated to church groups and parishes since 2012. This is to ensure everyone especially children below 18, has a safe environment when dealing with church members like priests, full-time church workers, volunteers and catechists. In St Ignatius Church, there are also two Catechists teaching in each class. In addition, CCTV cameras are installed in offices and classrooms for security and safety.

With regards to selection process, candidates who apply to join priestly and religious life are now given adequate and thorough psychological screening and tests to remove those who are potential predators. This was not the case in the past. Hence, this is one obvious failure in the membership recruitment process that since has been tightened by the Vatican and seminaries around the world. It is necessary to prevent as far as possible those who have been abused as a child from entering into the clerical life. They would not be emotionally fit and should not be given access to children or be placed in positions where they could become abusers themsleves. The majority of priests are good and holy men, and it is heart wrenching when people paint them with the same brush as the predators are painted. Every calling or profession is made up of individuals. It shouldn't be assumed to be corrupt or cruel because of the actions of a few rotten apples.

Similarly, those in authority cannot compromise the responsibility and authority vested in those who are formators and Rectors of Seminaries. They have a responsi-

bility to root out undesirable and unsuitable candidates from their ranks – those who have unhealthy psychological pathologies to become potential abusers. If not, it will be akin to letting a wolf into the chicken coop.

Perhaps, I summarise our response in the apt words of St Augustine: "Hope has two beautiful daughters; their names are Anger and Courage. Anger at the way things are, and Courage to see that they do not remain as they are." Let us not be paralysed by anger or by pain, but let us do everything we can to make changes to give us hope to restore justice and goodness, and stand up for the victims and their rights, and ensure all perpetrators, even if they are priests, are reported to the police and face the consequences of their wrongdoing. It is only then that we can find a God whose heart bleeds for the innocent children and victims who have suffered for far too long in silence. We must break this silence of abuse.

It is also a time for us to strengthen our faith in the midst of crisis. Some may be tempted to jump ship when it is sinking. If we do abandon the sinking ship, we do well to ask ourselves like Peter, "Lord who shall we go to? You have the message of eternal life." Yes, we will need to examine our faith in times of crisis. We need to be courageous, faithful and uncompromising in our love for Our Lord and his church. As one priest, Fr Mike from Minnesota implored, "Don't leave but lead the Church." True leaders and good shepherds are those who do not turn away in times of crisis, but dare to stand up for the truth, for the victims, for the weak and vulnerable.
