Spiritual High Fidelity!

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ne of the great joys of working in the parish is participating in the many joyful sacramental and liturgical celebrations, like weddings and baptisms. For me, it is certainly not about being in the limelight, acting as the main celebrant or minister, but the honour of sharing in these memorable moments in people's lives. In these blessed instances, people not only express their happiness, but also their faith in the eternal and all-loving God.

Pope Francis intimated that "God is 'mirrored' in a marriage, because the reality of God's faithful love for humanity is reflected in the bond of matrimony." In a baptism, one publicly affirms his or her love for God, and sacramentally and formally enters into a relationship covenantal with the Lord. There is, perhaps, nothing

exhilarating than feelings of being loved by someone and returning that love. Celebrating these rites bring those feelings into greater focus. Thus, these moments are also important milestones in our faith journey.

Last week I was involved in something that was certainly more subdued than a typical wedding or baptism. It was a celebration of a couple's eighteenth wedding anniversary, but it was done with very little fanfare. There was no pretty bouquet of flowers, there was no choir serenading the couple. And the event was attended by less than ten people, not wearing their "Sunday best". Despite eighteen years of marriage, husband and wife seemed almost embarrassed when they held hands awkwardly and haltingly pledged their love and fidelity to each other. There wasn't any indication of "emotional high" at the simple celebration, but yet

there was a great sense of joy. The almost mundane affair reflects the husband and wife's familiarity with each other, but their bashfulness and awkwardness also betray a certain "newness" in their relationship. Perhaps they were young two people caught up with excitement of the moment when they first exchanged their marriage vows eighteen years ago, but since then they have grown and become a

"new creation", living out faithfully the matrimonial promises in their regular existence. In "renewing" their marital vows on their eighteenth anniversary, they were not trying to recapture the euphoria of being newlyweds, but celebrating and reaffirming their commitment to love each other, in sickness and in health, in good times and bad, in happiness and in grief, and in their mundane everyday life. committed not to a particular moment or an experience, but to each other.

In our spiritual lives, sometimes, by the grace of God, we experience moments of great consolation manifested by feelings of spiritual and emotional "high". These feelings of elation, of uncontainable joy, may come after a fruitful retreat or some other profound spiritual experience. It is, therefore, entirely understandable to have the desire to relive these moments of great consolation. However, our faith cannot be exclusively focused on searching and reliving only the blissful moments.

In this Sunday's Gospel reading, Jesus reminds us that Christian discipleship is not escapism, but entails "taking up of the cross". Like the couple who celebrated their eighteenth wedding anniversary, Christian disciples do not live only for spiritual consolations, but are committed to the person of Jesus and living out his or her calling, in times of joy, trials and the grind of ordinary life. We do not seek the Lord only in uplifting experiences, but find God in all things.

Responding to God's Call

God works in different ways, most of the time, through ordinary people and events – a parent, a friend, a beautiful sunset, a song, an inspiring story. Other times, we hear God's call during crises or life changes – birth, engagement, sickness, death. Sometimes, we just have a feeling that something is missing.

The Catholic Church's mission is to help people respond to God; initiation and ongoing participation in the life of the Church are the primary responses to God's call. We try to help people learn how to respond to that call not just for baptism, but for every day of their lives. The way we learn how to become Catholic is by actually doing what Catholics do. So the process of being initiated into the Church is not so much about learning things as in a classroom, but learning a way of life as an apprentice learns from a master and that master's community.

Being Accepted

Becoming Catholic is a process, the first part of which is called **Evangelization and Precatechumenate**. In this initial phase, an unbaptized adult or child over seven is moved to inquire about the Catholic Church. Through informal contact with a member of the Church, he or she begins to explore issues of faith, questions they've always had about the Church, or anything that has moved them to seek some kind of relationship with the Church. This part of the process can happen anytime for as long as needed.

When the inquiring person and the Church community believe that he or she is starting to show signs of a Christian faith and is ready to commit to becoming Catholic, the person is invited to celebrate

a ritual called a "Rite of Acceptance into the Order of the Catechumenate", officially and publicly declaring his or her intention to enter into a formal relationship with the Church, learning its ways and participating in its lifestyle. The Church, in turn, accepts their commitment and pledges its support throughout the person's journey of faith.

This rite makes the person an official member of the Church as one who is preparing to be baptized, becoming a "catechumen" which means "one in whom the Word of God echoes". In preparation for this rite, the Church gives the inquirer a gift — one of its own baptized members to be a sponsor and companion through the next part of the process called the Period of the Catechumenate.

The Word and the Assembly

In order to learn how to take up the cross of Christ each day of their lives, these catechumens will need to be nourished by the Word of God, for "one does not live by bread alone, but by every word that comes from the mouth of God" (Matthew 4:4). In the Scriptures that they will hear at Sunday Mass, God speaks, and in the Gospels, Christ proclaims to all that God's promises last forever. No matter what the catechumens will encounter — suffering, pain, obstacles, doubt, fear, sin, death — God will never leave them. God's love through Christ never fails.

Where we encounter Christ and His love most clearly is in the assembly. When God's people gather on Sunday to proclaim the Scriptures, offer prayers for the world, and remember Christ in the sharing of a meal — the Eucharist — Christ is truly present. The catechumens learn how to live as Christ through the assembly, which models for them how to die to selfishness,

how to forgive others, how to preach the Good News, and how to live in hope through the Holy Spirit.

The catechumens will depend on the Spirit of God found in the assembly to apprentice them into a life of discipleship. Because they are not yet baptized, they cannot yet participate in the prayers of the faithful, which are the Creed, the General Intercessions, and the Eucharistic Prayer, which climaxes in Communion. Therefore, after the homily, the catechumens, accompanied by a member of the baptized, are sent to feast on the Word of God, to reflect on how God is continuing to call them in this part of their faith journey, and to discern how they are to respond.

The Threshold

This door of the Church is an important symbol in many Catholic rites. Doors symbolize transitions and new ways of life. For Christians, Christ, the Good Shepherd and the gate for the sheep, is the most important door, because "whoever enters through [Christ] will be saved, and will come in and go out and find pasture" (John 10:9). But doors are also liminal spaces, inbetween places that are neither here nor there. Even though Christ has died and risen to save us from death, we still live in the in-between time until Christ comes again to welcome all of creation through the doors of the kingdom of God.

In the Rite of Acceptance, those wishing to answer God's call are met at the threshold of the Church by the baptized and are ritually welcomed to enter into the Church's doors.

The Cross

To enter into Christ means entering into His dying and rising, for he said, "whoever wishes to come after me must deny himself, take up his cross, and follow me" (Mark 8:34). Those who answer God's call will need to learn how to let go and die to their old ways of life, and this will often be painful and difficult. But the cross is also the sign of our salvation. So in the Rite of Acceptance, the Church consecrates — sets apart and makes holy – those who are committing themselves to following Christ

by signing their bodies with the cross.
