The Reign of Christ

he Feast of Christ the King marks the end of history, both secular and the long story of the People of God. It is the end to all that the Old Testament prepared and foreshadowed, and is the actualization of all that Christ rendered imminent by His coming. The culmination of the Incarnation is the Second Person's assumption of a most intimate relationship with creation, becoming even more incarnate in physical reality than we are. This feast is also the playing out of His Passion and Death, the apparently ultimate frustration of God's plans and hopes for us, just as it is actually the fulfilment of the Resurrection and Ascension. It is even the completion of the coming of the Holy Spirit to create and quicken the People of God, the Church.

This is where the concept of the Mystical Body becomes more than an idea. We are more intimately the People of God by being joined – through Baptism, Confirmation, the Eucharist, Reconciliation, and other sacraments – into Christ's Body, even into His very person and identity. The Holy Spirit was just as responsible for the origination of Christ's Mystical Body as He was for the Babe of Bethlehem, and through that same Spirit Jesus has been working in His Mystical Body ever since, affecting the world, and through all those who have chosen to join themselves to Him.

This feast is the celebration of the New Jerusalem of the last chapters of the Book of Revelation, where Christ subsumes His people into that heavenly city which is His own self: there is no need for a Temple. It is the celebration of the New Creation, where the old creation has finally reached its goal in becoming, through the Incarnation, redeemed and renewed in every sense of these words: Christ is Himself that New Creation, and we live in His Heart, even now at the center of the life of the Trinity.

We return to our beginning, the Garden: God created us to be innocent and familiar with Him in a world of perfect peace, and this is what we celebrate today. We have eaten of the fruit of the Tree of the Knowledge of Good and Evil, and yet God returns us to innocence by His love and we now eat gratefully the fruit of the Tree of His life (Gen 2:9, 16-17).

It is not the Crucified Christ nor the Risen Christ who comes to the fore, but the Incarnate Christ whose Mystical Body is itself the Kingdom which He presents to the Father, the New Creation which is no longer at a distance from God's presence and His love, but a creation which is so completely healed and transformed by Jesus the Christ that it is now incorporated into God's very being.

Jesus is not just a King, He is on the one hand the very substrate and form of all created reality, in absolute control of all of it, and on the other, nothing but a humble and passionate love for every member, bit, and aspect of that reality. The "reign" of Christ in "power and glory" is rooted in that love.

That, I believe, is the situation, but just what will we do about it? The answer will be different for each of us and will be something we can only find



In the month of November, we pray that the souls of our loved ones "and all the faithful departed, through the mercy of God, rest in peace." The Church teaches that "All who die in God's arace and friendship, but still imperfectly purified, are indeed assured of their eternal salvation; but after death they undergo purification, so as to achieve the holiness necessary to enter the joy of heaven." (CCC 1030) We in the Bereavement Ministry, the Lilies of the Valley, pray at the wakes of our parishioners and assist at their funeral Masses and praver services at cremation or burial. We not only assist the bereaved, but the departed in their purification before entry to heaven. For this important but unpredictable work, we need a large number of members, currently about 100, to ensure a good presence at wakes, and sufficient support at funerals. We are all called to Acts of Mercy, the loving-your-neighbour part of our Faith. If you find it difficult to commit to other ministries because of your unpredictable schedule, please consider joining us in our work which is much appreciated - as the reflections on page 3 show.

After I joined Lilies of the Valley, our Bereavement Ministry, I said prayers with the family and I felt that strong sense of love and compassion for the grieving family. I empathized with their loss. I also felt that I was accompanying the deceased to meet Jesus, with the angels and saints waiting in welcome. I felt honoured to be a companion. The family is always grateful, some of them very moved, and eventually joining the ministry. Our work involves:

- Attending funeral mass (optional)
- Sending off at the crematorium (optional)

Come, be part of us to experience the compassionate mercy and love of Jesus.

Chriscelia Tan: I did not know anyone from the prayer group, but they were so prayerful and I felt so touched these people went all the way to St Mary's to pray for mum. They were all so kind. We are not Catholic yet, have not met them before, yet they were so willing to pray for mum. (Chriscelia's mother was baptised a week before she passed away. Her father was baptised recently. Chriscelia is undergoing RCIA.)

Darren Tham: I joined LOTV because I was touched by the devotion during my father's wake. After 6 years, I know I have chosen wisely. It's a humbling and spiritually rewarding vocation.

Olivia Menon: My father passed away last December – just days before Christmas. He had been ill in hospital 3 weeks prior

to his passing. It had been a difficult time for my family and we were all exhausted. When it finally came to organising his wake and funeral we were so grateful to have the invaluable assistance of the members of the Lilies of the Valley. The wake turned out to be longer than we anticipated as we had to wait for members of the family to travel from overseas, and, given it was Christmas time, the church was not available for funerals on certain days. The wake stretched on for 6 days, yet the Lilies turned up every single night to pray with my family. And at 3pm when other members came to pray The Divine Mercy Chaplet with us. I was amazed that there were people, unfamiliar to me, who were willing to comfort us and give of

their precious time during such a busy season. I asked why they weren't home enjoying the season with their families? The members replied, "We will after we pray with you!" Truly I experienced the love of Christ for me in this selfless outpouring of compassion. I asked how I could ever repay them. One member said, "Come join us and pay it forward!" So I did. It has been almost one year now and I can say that it has been a privilege to pray with grieving families. I continue to stand in awe of the commitment that members of this ministry show. It is quite possibly one of the most powerful images of the meaning of "church" to know there is a community that stands with you during your most difficult moments.

With you beneath the Cross As strangers we enter, you know not why ... We wear the same badge of loss and pain; Our presence, our prayers to lighten your darkness, To share Faith, candles of our love and hope ... We walk the last steps with you.

Patricia Pellmann: The Bereavement Ministry is one that is noble and fulfilling, where we are able to perform our Christian duty of sending off beautiful souls to Jesus through wake prayers and a dignified memorial mass before they are committed to their final resting place. It is through the personal
