"But his soul was mad. Being alone in the wilderness, it had looked within itself and, by heavens I tell you, it had gone mad." JOSEPH CONRAD, HEART OF DARKNESS

hen I was studying literature, I was fascinated by Conrad's book, Heart of Darkness. The title itself was intriguing, to say the least. It tells about the white man's mission to bring the "light of civilization" to the African continent in the days of colonialism. This mission, however, was often used as a disguise by white men to exploit Africa's resources, such as ivory. The main character, Marlow, leads an expedition on the Congo River to search for a man called Kurtz, who is his trading company's most efficient agent. Upon finding Kurtz, he is shocked to find that the man has lost all semblance of civility and humanity - he has become mad! Hence, the irony - instead of bringing a civilising "light", Kurtz was engulfed by the darkness of greed and exploitation.

Going deeper into the psyche of a person, Conrad shows how good can be overwhelmed by evil and the magnitude of darkness when a person (Kurtz) loses his moral compass and ethical bearing in the face of overwhelming horror, absurdity and lies. This scenario is perhaps not so uncommon today. We see it being played out on the world's stage even in the most advanced nations.

Jesus tells us, in the Gospel today, in no uncertain terms that it is from the store of goodness that one draws out goodness. Often the core of a person lies in his heart—that which makes him weak or strong, fearless or cowardly;

savage or saintly; good or evil. Still we are aware of the complexity of life that shapes a person's outlook in life. Is he positive or pessimistic? Is she petty or magnanimous? Is he devout or devious?

Our challenge as Christians today is not to be overwhelmed by evil and darkness around us and become cynical and lose faith in ourselves, in the Church and in God. Indeed, how does one remain true and faithful to one's dream and conviction in the goodness of every person even when he displays vulgarity, profanity, anger and madness to those who try to do good for him?

One does not have to search too far to find out that such persons may still be harbouring hurts, unforgiveness that infect the person's virulent heart which spreads the cancer to the whole body. Worst of all, they pose a danger to others by attacking them with daggers of insults whose tips are coated with venomous words that sting and even kill.

Jesus knows the heart of man. He offers an antidote to us—to have a heart of love and compassion. To be a tree that bears good fruit. We do have a choice not to be overtaken by cynicism, anger, despair and darkness. Jesus invites us to be transmiter of light, love and life to others. Our hearts are made to love and not to hate. It is hard to love but everyone has a heart to love. How can I be more loving in my heart, thoughts and actions?

AN EXAMEN FOR LENT Encountering the Desert

Imagine yourself in a desert. You experience the heat of day, the cold of night, shifting sands, dust storms, wild animals and, if you are lucky, some sparse greenery and an oasis.

You are alone. Even if you have a friend with you, it is a lonely track through unchartered terrain. In the desert, you encounter fear, vulnerability and the unknown. You make do with what you have. And what you do not have, you cannot get, at least not immediately.

Our Christian tradition reminds us of the desert experience of our ancestors in faith; how the Israelites wandered in the desert for 40 years before they arrived in the Promised Land, how the prophet Elijah journeyed for 40 days and nights before he heard God's voice at Mount Horeb, and though his experience was far from dry, Noah's 40 days and nights "at sea".

God, at some moment in time, reaches out to His people and leads them home.

Jesus lived in the wilderness for 40 days. He was hungry, thirsty and tempted. Three times the evil one found an opportunity to test Him. Between good and evil, choose, and choose now! Why wait? You can have happiness forever? Turn to me not God! Jesus was armed with the weaponry of the Word to ward off all that was contrary to the fullness of life in God.

In the desert, away from everything else, we discover more about ourselves, and our need for God. Still, for some, God is "just not there". It may take time, 40 days, 40 years, more, God's time! Like the persons who have come through their wilderness, we too walk in faith with a God who has not abandoned us. For others, past experiences of being in a "desert" help get through yet another difficult time or to quide a friend get through her struggles. While there are churches, chapels, shrines, altars, crosses, where we find God, we also find our God in this journey through this desert. 40 days for less of ME, and more of GOD!

An Awareness Exercise for Lent

- 1. Ask God for the grace to encounter the desert.
- 2. Review how you have experienced God already. Be thankful.
- 3. Recall where you are most in need of God in your life today. What do you seek? How is God seeking you?
- 4. Ask for forgiveness if you have not responded well.
- 5. Look towards the Light of Christ. Ask to live in that Light in the future.

(Spend 10-15 minutes in prayer for the above exercise)
