ocial inequality. Climate change. Food shortages. War. All the strife and confusion in the world. All that befalls people. They concern us as humanity. We need to know how it happened, in order to try to avoid it in the future. What is not a concern is to judge why something happened, why someone killed, why someone became a refugee.

If we feel unable to bring good into the world, to change horrible events that happen, reflect instead on being more grateful for the life we have. But, who is responsible for the good things in our lives? Are we tangibly manipulating our entire good life? Are we always able, always in control?

As a religious, I propose that the most profitable reflection we can have is really how we can be more like incarnated grace to the unseen others, bringing love and mercy to those in need. There is a beauty in being grateful. The common good of my life is not all within my grasp, but is greatly dependent on others, most especially God.

More importantly, I can contribute to that common good by being charitable and good to others. In fact, we will feel uncomfortable, because it should challenge the status quo. Precisely because the status quo has resulted in people in need, having a different life from us, have greater or different lack from us.

This difference creates stratification of life, and of the opportunities available. These people are seemingly our antithesis. However, the division between others and us is against the notion that the kingdom of God is for everyone, including our enemies.

While we do occasionally construct divisions, hide information, move against others, often the motivating source is negative, of fear of change, a lack of courage to face up to difficult conversations, or shame and cowardice of our imperfections. We can even feel merciful in not distressing the other persons by hiding things – which is not a bad thing in itself.

Such ambiguity is not for us to judge. Jesus asked not the reasons why people were poor or afflicted by their sins. Jesus asked them what they wished, and gave them what they wished for, including healing them of their sins and infirmities.

If we were asked about the good that we do, the fruits of our lives, would people ask us about our faith? Or would there be other qualifying measures that matter more? At the end of time, what would God ask? How would we respond to God then?

The season of Lent tries to let us get to know God – and ourselves – a little better. Ask yourself what you would do when asked by God – and think about what you might do now, in order to bear better fruits in the future. Lent is a season for preparation. Seize the opportunity to take stock, ask for Jesus' mercy, help and blessings, and make the necessary changes.

Portion of God's Love

n the Old Testament Book of Joshua Chapter 22, the Western and Eastern Tribes of Israel were instructed by Joshua to take possession of the land in Cana, that was promised to them by God, on the west and east side of the River Jordan, respectively. Because the Eastern tribes were separated from the Western tribes by the Jordan River, they decided to build a great and impressive altar to the Lord.

The altar would not be for burnt offerings or sacrifices, but as a witness between them and the rest of Israel that they too worship the Lord so that future descendants would not say that they had "no share in the Lord". They wanted to claim their portion of the Lord their God. Of course this entire chapter reveals other fascinating aspects of honest and true worship of God; however, what touched me most was the Eastern tribes' boldness in building this great altar as a witness of their true worship of a faithful God who fought their battles with and for them so that they could finally enter into the covenantal Promised Land.

In wondering what I ought to do this Lent, I thought, "Lord, how can I claim my portion of you?"


I know that we have Jesus Christ, today and everyday, and he is now and always our entire

portion of God's love, because he was the ultimate and final sacrifice for us to now claim our place in eternal life with the Holy Trinity. Should I, like the Eastern tribes, go and do something bold, big and great as witness that I worship the one true God?

There is so much I want to do, but the reality of my present situation tells me that there is only so much I can do and that is not much. Then I read another verse in Joshua 22 when the Eastern tribes had to explain to the rest of Israel why they had to build this great altar – they were accused of building a rival place of worship ... and their answer was: "The Mighty One, God, the Lord! The Mighty One, God, the Lord! He knows".

I am reminded that God knows the most secret thoughts and desires of our hearts. He knows. So I shall begin by reading His Word more this Lent, that I instead may know more of Him, more of His purpose for me. And ask for His grace to listen and obey. I may not be able to build a great big altar as a witness of my faith, but with the strength and grace of the Holy Spirit, I can start with small beginnings, my family, my community.
