Through the Valley of Darkness

t's due. Preparations fade in the light of the coming revelation waiting to be received anew, relished and reflected through our own lives. It's worthwhile to seek forgiveness for past transgressions, because there is a future awaiting us, welcoming us.

This future is for all of us. That's a radical thought from the Boston College presentation, *Confronting The Soul-Devouring Dragon: Sexual Abuse and the Mystery of Evil*, presented by Sr Margaret Guider, OSF. Are we at the radical stage of conversion that allows us to listen to the protagonists, as well as the victims and survivors?

Reconciliation cannot be forced or turned on like tap water, yet we can allow for its possibility of its possibility. Reconciliation helps deal with the evil that afflicts us all, enabling vulnerability, and thus courage and hope to be nurtured, to illuminate the darkness from evil.

Thinking in a broad systems way, the impact of evil is far reaching. The unity of communities is disrupted by evil. Resources are diverted to deal with unfolding situations, instead of furthering the kingdom of heaven. Good works are reduced significantly in turn. Not just the protagonists, victims and survivors, but also the community gets sucked into the quagmire evil begets.

The answer is not to bury our heads and wish it away, but to look at it. Does evil's reality shock us? Courage and hope allows us to look at that reality, and ponder a space for creative responses, and more importantly, to be Christians again. We need to respond, but as Chris-

tians, troubled, hopeful, courageously, creatively, humbly, lovingly.

Who are we going to call, when things go bad? Friends, family, those in position of power? Why not angels and principalities, seraphims and cherubims, and all the saints in heaven? Why not Mary, our greatest intercessor who never fails us?

Evil reduces our capacity to be Christian. There is a real mystery about evil. Yet we should never make light or ignore the need for mercy and healing, for active, creative measures, nor the twinned and necessary need to pray. More than just belief or action, prayer counters evil directly, yet mysteriously. Grace versus evil. Pope Francis knows that. Hence the call to pray rosaries and the St Michael prayer.

Also, Jesus forgave, freely. Those who were also involved with that evil, are allowed a space to consider freely, to reform and repent. To listen to the Gospel without being cast as the enemy – a case of mistaking protagonists for the evil that afflicts them. Forgive, forgive, forgive.

This is the radical message we are called to contemplate in the coming weeks. In the face of great suffering, Jesus suffered, died and entrusted himself to God's love and grace. In contemplating him who died for us, our sins can be overturned even today. Be once more united as a community. Proclaim, witness to God's word of mercy. Cooperate with God, make the kingdom of heaven here on earth.
