Laws deaden when we expect less of ourselves because we "only" have to follow the law. Jesus takes the law as a reference point for living a life that makes a difference.

"Let's focus on fuel efficiency and don't worry about speed traps or overtaking. It's also a nice drive."

As such, Jesus repeatedly says, "But I say this to you." As if to challenge our old ideas and attitudes, to remind us of a way of being that goes beyond obeying the law. One that encompasses a healthy attitude and regard for ourselves.

"Oooh – sugee cake! This inspires me to experiment making sugee crisps – all the flavour and crunch, minus almost all the eggs, flour, butter and sugar... and good for dunking in rum!"

Jesus shows that the Spirit – reaching beyond such laws – would make us alive instead, because with the

Spirit we can see beyond the boundary of the law. Our lives can wholesomely unfold, creatively and fruitfully.

"Great, bus is here, I'll be early for volunteering, then later to the market, get some groceries, and slowly stroll back..."

Embrace life – thorns and all, rules and boundaries. Be extraordinary, be Catholic, and live with the creative, loving, Spirit of God.

arried couples in contemporary Singapore face more challenges and societal pressures than ever before. Even young couples starting their new life together juggle competing demands of work and home. Add children to the equation and the fine-balanced act, (if there ever was any) is knocked off-kilter. Today's always-online and jet-setting work culture blurs the line between the home and workplace.

The Couple Empowerment Program (CEP), now in its 10th year (inception in 2006), has been addressing these and other challenges faced by modern day couples. CEP creates self-awareness and equips married couples with emotionally intelligent life skills. The program enhances marriage spirituality by imparting a post-marriage catechesis in line with Catholic teachings. CEP under the auspices of the Archdiocesan Commission for the Family answers the call for a continuum formation for newly-weds, bridging pre-marriage programs such as Engaged Encounter and Marriage Preparation Course, with Marriage Encounter.

Topics explored in CEP include the need for couple communication, unity and intimacy; how to maintain a work-life balance; how to enjoy a harmonious relationship with parents and in-laws; discovering fulfilling couple sexuality; the church's teaching on procreation and parenting children. All sessions combine teachings of the magisterium, insights from marriage psychology and life skills

which build and sustain healthy marital relationships.

A CEP participant shares the stark but familiar realities of marriage life: "There were times when I felt unsupported by my partner, creating fissures of resentment from time to time. However, having gone through this journey in CEP, I find our relationship has changed to become a more collaborative and giving. It has been good because I feel more contented and happy." After attending CEP, Hendri feels, "CEP taught me that marriage is a process; it is a continuous learning for both me and my wife. Since marriage is a process, it will never be 100 percent perfect. But, it will always grow better, each day we decide to love each other."

Edward Schillebeeckx, a 20th century theologian, writes, "Marriage is a human reality and a saving mystery." CEP not only touches on human realities, but also unpacks the spiritual truth that serves to give hope to all. CEP reveals the importance of guidance and support during the early years when marriages are more prone to conflicts while couples are adjusting to a new life together. During these formative years, spouses struggle to accept each other's differences in personality, family practices, values and attitudes. They are also grappling to learn how to cope with new responsibilities in managing a household, finances, parenting and raising kids, caring for aged parents and their careers. One couple felt that the real-life sharing by other married couples

I always felt that I had to put my children first and my spouse second. [After CEP] my spouse is now my best friend ... and the good news is the children are happier when parents put their marriage FIRST.

We make it a priority to set aside more couple time even with tight schedules. We recognize the need to bond strongly and set a good example for our children.

The part about in-laws, which had caused tons of unhappiness and unforgiveness (sic) in our household, simply evaporated – almost overnight! It felt like a ton of bricks lifted off our shoulders.

He now gives me time to tell him about my day – we have both agreed that we should put our lphone/lpad aside before we retire just to talk and catch up on the day's events.

I think he realized that he has to make more time for us. When he was called for a game with his friends recently, he even considered turning it down. I was really surprised.

We gained a lot from the sharing by CEP couples. We were inspired that with God at the centre of our marriage, we can face up to all our problems.

revealed that everyone faces very similar challenges, and that they are not alone in their struggles. After participating in CEP, couples form communities with the aim to continually seed, sustain and re-invigorate themselves and fellow parishioners to establish good marital and family lives within their parish. This year from Sunday, 26 March, 9 sessions of CEP will be held at the Church of St Ignatius.
