s a scholastic reading theology in Dublin many years ago, I remember taking a whole course on the Holy Trinity, and we also had to read a small book for our final paper. Unfortunately, I do not remember anything about the course or the book, or even the name of the professor. What I do remember is the emotion - it was a difficult course coupled with an uninspiring lecturer. I will not put you through my attempts to explain what the Holy Trinity is all about. Over the years, I have shared with others, especially those from my RCIA class, the basic catechism on the Holy Trinity. The Trinity can be understood as the loving relationship between and among, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. So think in terms of a family relationship, God the Father is the Father because there is the Son, Jesus Christ, and the bond of love between the Father and the Son is the Holy Spirit.

You may ask, "What has the Holy Trinity to do with my life as a baptized

Catholic, and especially today as we celebrate Father's Day?" Perhaps nothing or everything! If it is "nothing" then we do not have to pay much attention to it, but if it is "everything" then we need to reflect on this Most Holy Trinity. It may or may not be coincidental that we are also celebrating this Holy Trinity on Father's Day.

As we celebrate Father's Day on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, we may want to call to mind the perceived image and experience/encounter with our own fathers. What type of father do you think St Joseph, the foster father of Jesus, was, or perhaps Jesus himself as a spiritual

father? Where would Jesus of Nazareth learn to be a father, if not from modelling the person of St Joseph in his carpentry shop when he was growing up. Modelling after one's father is innate for many learning how to be a father. Our personal experience of a father often provides us with a mental and an emotional template of what a father should be, and how to go about being one, since there is no school out there to teach a person how to be a parent. We learn by modelling or assimilation - "values are not taught but caught". Our image and experience of a father often dictates who we are as a father, perhaps one who is gentle, kind, loving, compassionate, attentive, thoughtful, sensitive, prayerful, or even "motherly" in some ways - characteristics that we attribute more often to mothers but can reside in fathers too. Personally, I have come across such characteristics in fathers,

even in my own father who possesses some of these wonderful graces from God. Keep in mind too that children may experience their fathers differently,

even when living under the same roof. It is the perception or interpretation of the interaction between father and child that will eventually form our image or model of what a father should be.

The point that I hope to get across on this great feast of the Holy Trinity and on Father's Day is that our relationship and experience with our father, to a large extent would determine who or what we are as fathers. Acknowledging too the possibility of "corrective parenting/fathering script" in one's life. The saving grace is that fathers can still learn from whatever "failed attempts" by re-modelling their connectivity with their children from the example of Jesus Christ and his Abba Father. Jesus was always in touch with God his Father, praying early in the morning and at the close of the day. Jesus would take time to pray, have that conversation with his Father about his day, seek his Father's guidance, support and strength to continue with his often challenging and at times dangerous mission. Bear in mind too that communication should be both ways, and not "I talk, you listen".

Fathers too need that constant spiritual conversation, support and strength from God the Father in your fatherly journey here. Hence the idea of a fathers' retreat is one that I hope will happen at our Kingsmead Centre — for fathers to come together to learn and share what it is to be father to your children and husband to your wife. Of course, with the "permission" of your wife to spend a weekend at Kingsmead Center, away from the family to bond spiritually with God the Father through Jesus Christ, and with other fathers there.

On this Father's Day, we need to express our heartfelt gratitude to our father who is often taken for granted as provider and protector of the family. Fathers are also in constant need of loving affirmation by those around them, especially their wives regarding their important mission as fathers, but more so as spiritual heads of the family. Like St Joseph of Nazareth in his loving co-parenting role in bringing up Jesus, our Risen Lord, we give thanks and praise to our own fathers today as we celebrate Father's Day. May the Most Holy Trinity continue to bless and keep our fathers, and grandfathers, safe in God's love! Happy and Blessed Father's Day!

Monday 17 June, Loyola Room, 7.30pm Programme: Video on Miracles of the Eucharist hristians are increasingly drawn to contemplation, even though many are unsure of what it entails. "Contemplation" sounds lofty and out of reach for the ordinary Christians, as if it is a domain
reserved for the select and holy few. But, is it?

CONTEMPLATING

In its simplest form, contemplation is a conscious gaze at something that one loves. To contemplate is to pay attention and be fully present to that something or someone special. For example, we contemplate the ocean by spending hours gazing at the far horizon where the sea meets the sky, observing the ebb and flow of the waves, watching the seagulls swooping down to fish, noticing the subtle changes brought by the seasons, diving deep to experience the living creatures undersea. To contemplate the ocean is to be aware of the fascinating interplay between us — the observer — and the ocean — the observed.

The more time we spend contemplating the ocean, the more we know the ocean. We can study it from the textbooks, but unless we swim and spend time in it, we will never truly know the ocean. What may start as an intellectual encounter must deepen into an experience. We can apply this to any subject: insects, flowers, forests, loved ones.

Let's take a mother and a baby as another example. A baby senses and recognizes its mother's presence; when she is near, it longs to be picked up and held. It's a reality that the baby may not understand rationally, but it has tasted the warmth of her tender hugs and loving gaze. Similarly, a mother may immediately awaken from a deep sleep by a soft whimper of her baby. If the nine months form an unbreakable bond of love between a mother and her baby, how great would the bond between us and the Lord, who created us, be? "Before I formed you in the womb, I knew you; before you were born, I sanctified you" (Jer 1:5) Would our soul not know and long for the Love who has created and cared for us everlasting?

The Psalmist proclaims, "O LORD, you have searched me and known me ... If I ascend into heaven, You are there; if I make my bed in hell, behold, You are there ... and that my soul knows very well" (Psalm 139). God is everywhere; we are immersed in His presence. Our mind may not comprehend Him, but our soul knows Him: He who is before us, behind us, besides us, beneath us, within us. We live in the Presence. The Presence that permeates in every cell of our being and calls us unceasingly to be with Him. It is the call that reaches even the simplest of hearts.

St John Vianney once found an old farmer in the Church staring at the Tabernacle everyday. The saint asked the farmer what he was doing, and the man explained, "I look at Him and He looks at me." The farmer was contemplating the Lord in the Blessed Sacrament, as the Lord was contemplating the farmer too. To contemplate is to love and to be loved.

The Lord is inviting us to adore Him, and most importantly, to be adored by Him. Let us be still in His presence as He gazes at us with delight. It is the gaze of a lover, where heart speaks to heart, and words, redundant.

Be silent. Be still.

Alone.

Empty

Before your God

Say nothing.

Ask nothing.

Be silent.

Be still.

Let your God

Look upon you.

That is all.

God knows.

God understands.

God loves you

With an enormous love,

And only wants

To look upon you

With that love.

Quiet.

Still.
