Mission, Possible


he word "mission" conjures up many vivid images for many of missionaries making arduous journeys to spread the Gospel; of crowds thronging remote churches to celebrate the Eucharist together; of the rapt attention of people listening to the Word being proclaimed and broken. Mission means much to us, but I wonder if anyone else also sometimes hears the theme from TV series and film Mission Impossible when one hears the word "mission". The thing I remember most about the series was how the main character would receive instructions for his mission on a tape or other device that would later state, "This message will self-destruct in 5 seconds". The message would burn or explode, leaving no trace of it ever being given. This is probably good for secret agents to keep their missions secret and was a great plot device for the show as well. However, it's quite far from the kind of mission that we're called to and provides an interesting counterpoint to examine how the Lord actually calls us to be on mission.

The messages that Mission Impossible agents receive are from an anonymous superior and the messages themselves are destroyed very quickly after reception. The anonymity of the sender points to a certain distance that exists between the one who sends and the one who goes on mission. It's very different when Jesus called and sent his disciples. Not only did he call each by name, he also sent them only after having built up a strong relationship of faith and trust in them, giving them the confidence to go out on this mission to spread the good news of the Kingdom to people who might not be so receptive. Unlike self-destructing messages, his message remains and there's also a tacit hint of his

continuing presence with them even as they go out on this initial mission.

The disciples were asked to be agents of peace, bringing peace to the houses that they visit. While it's somewhat disingenuous to try to compare the peacebringing disciples to the secret agents in action movies or TV shows that usually portray a certain amount of violence, I believe the mission that the disciples received is crucial for our time. There was a great need for peace and reconciliation during the time of Jesus and this need is all the greater in our current age. The difficulty in trying to bring peace in our fractured world where aggression is still prized is that the peace-makers will indeed end up being like "lambs among wolves", the odd ones out who reject even the little acts of violence around them only to become persecuted themselves. Again, the presence of the Lord and his confidence in their ability to fulfil this mission must have been a great boost to them that allowed them to go out to become agents of peace.

The final difference is the feeling that one gets when the mission is accomplished. In the TV shows and movies, the successful completion of the mission is often greeted with relief and sometimes a pat on the back of a job well done. It was quite different for the disciples who returned from the mission - they came back rejoicing, echoing the response from today's psalm, "Cry out with joy to God, all the earth". The disciples rejoiced because they were sent on mission to bring the good news to everyone around, and difficult as it might have been, the sense of purpose that came from their faith in the good news and the relationship with the Lord would have made even the most difficult experiences on mission joyful. all called to be, joyful disciples of the Lord on mission, showing the world that it's not success or praise that gives fulfilment. but joy in doing the will of the Lord in our daily lives.

Nurturing our relationship with the Lord lies at the heart of our ability to be good disciples and good bearers of the Word. The faith that allows one to overcome the difficulties on mission does not come from our own power, but stems from our relationship with the Lord and our openness to receive the grace of being one of the disciples. Through prayer, the sacraments and increasing familiarity with the Word of God, we too can develop this relationship on a daily basis. Challenging as the call to spread the good news can be, if we're grounded in our relationship with the Lord and can find joy in bringing peace to our world that is so in need of it, then what we have is actually Mission Possible.

The Renewal In Spirit Experience (ARISE) programme that encourages you to experience the love of our Trinitarian God with help from the Holy Spirit. As Jesus instructed:

"I have said these things to you while I am still with you. But the Advocate, the Holy Spirit, whom the Father will send in my name, will teach you everything, and remind you of all that I have said to you." John 14:25-26

Who Should Attend: Open to everyone who is seeking a closer relationship with God, anyone feeling spiritually or emotionally drained, and anyone who would like to pray together in a community. This includes people who had attended LISS, CER or other programmes before and would like a booster shot of the Holy Spirit. Renewal is an ongoing experience and is not limited to a one-time experience. Like cough syrup, turn to Him whenever you feel that there is irritation in your life.

One day during Mass, I heard Father talk about the importance of the Holy Spirit and as I listened to him, I realised that while I know who the Holy Spirit was, did I really know the Holy Spirit and his role in my life?

Fr Christopher Soh, who was Parish Priest at that time, led the first session of the LISS. Within 5 to 10 minutes of listening to him speak about "God's Love" and explain the role of the Holy Spirit in our life, I was hooked and every word he spoke made me realise that God was opening His arms to me wider and wider.

Shan Shan: It was during the darkest period of my life 10 years ago, that the Holy Spirit led me to attend LISS to receive His Healing Graces, Love and Transformation. I was overwhelmed by God's Love for me through the facilitators and participants. However, my healing did not occur 100 percent instantly. It had a dramatic start, after which, it came in small steps ... 5, 10 percent. Sometimes it took 3 steps forward and 2 steps back, but God wants us to persevere in faith and to surrender ourselves completely to Jesus, and healing will follow.

Aside from the Sacraments and our Priests, who helped me stay close to our Lord, the Eucharist and Our Blessed Mother are very much the centre of my life, with the Help of the Holy Spirit becoming alive in me and constantly inspiring me. After receiving the gift of the Holy Spirit, I realised that I could no longer follow my whims and fancies. I had to follow the Path of Growth with a Strict Instruction: To stay close to Him! And this I did and

God granted me a miracle! After 9 years of praying for my father, he was baptised a Catholic 14 months before he passed on to be with

our Lord last year.

Steph & John: As parents, we continue to live out our faith as best as we can, getting involved in various ministries and attending occasional retreats. It is often said that it takes a village to raise a child. Through our relationship with the Lord, we have a "village of saints in heaven", who are helping us guide our children in their daily lives. As typical parents, we try to provide a loving environment for their physical, emotional and spiritual growth, but it is really the Holy Spirit that is actively moulding them into better persons. This is where the mystery of God's love comes in.

Steven: I was brought up surrounded by traditional Chinese religion and ancestral worship beliefs. However, I didn't really feel like a better person after practicing them for 40 years. At 51 years old, I was baptised as a Catholic and began to read the Bible to know more about Jesus Christ. I joined the LISS and received the Sacrament of Reconciliation After a few days, during a healing session, I received the Gift of Tongues powerfully.

My perspective of my fellow man had totally changed; from anger, envy, hate and revenge into forgiveness and love. The Holy Spirit gave me the strength to forgive others. He also let God's love for His people grow in my heart.

What Will Be Your Story? There is no right or wrong, no story more glorifying than others. God just wants to have a relationship with you. A personal relationship between you and Him. Will you allow God to come into your life?
