Choosing to be Christian

eing a Christian can defy our usual conventions. I read about faith motivating the people to organize and take part in a public religious procession, held in total silence. In order to facilitate the prayer and praise of God during the procession, the people wrote their prayers, petitions and praise in little notebooks that they passed among themselves. However, as a protest against the oppressive dictatorial government that actively clamped down on dissent, the people instead wrote messages of dissent and planned further actions together, which they shared among themselves fervently.

In another place, a group of ladies were conducting a bible reflection activity among themselves. In their contemplation of a part of Jesus' life, one of the ladies cried softly to herself, for she suddenly gained an insight into Jesus' compassion for the woman at the well, and found herself to be that woman, looking for water that will never let her be thirsty again.

There is the account of the French MEP fathers who came to Singapore and went knocking from door to door of all the neighbouring households around their church, wanting to talk to the people about God. Though we now have greater inter-faith sensibility, still the humility of opening one's self up to rejection – and the accompanying shame – shows how their intentions were closer to Jesus, though still inadvertently fostering an undercurrent post-colonial tendency.

As Christians, we can't always

expect to walk clean pathways, take well-organized public transportation, or be able to please everyone. I don't think that's what Pope Francis would have imagined Christians would be doing if they were to go out into the world to minister and bring the Good News to others. It is quite interesting to note how much the Good News of Jesus Christ is needed, and in which locations.

For example, I am currently in St Joseph's Private School in Kuching, Sarawak, which is owned by the Archdiocese of Kuching and administered by the Jesuits. After being in some classes, and gaining some insight into the national Malaysian curriculum the school applies, I pity the students. Seemingly overwhelming demands are now placed on them, compared to my own educational experience in the public Malaysian school system of some 30 years ago.

As I observe the students – kids, really, even those of 17 years of age – I also get a sense that their parents are not getting it any easier. In fact, I candidly thought that some families needed help and guidance, to resolve some issues I think are manifested through the kids. Life as a parent, even in somewhat "sleepy" Kuching, is intriguing. Parents often work hard and long – and are compelled to compromise and make tough family choices.

I was reflecting on the family my parents created. As government servants, they were not without financial constraints, of which we kids were kept unaware. I knew we were not rich, and needed to be thrifty, but thank God,

never in need. Life even seemed idyllic, dream-like – golden-hued dreams, warm, loving. It's a far cry from the experiences shared by some of my affluent private students. Being alone on a weekend and watching Netflix might seem atypical to me, but I am getting the impression I am very wrong.

Yes, the choice to be a Christian and follow Christ is a path centered on the cross, a choice not of liking, but of commitment. A commitment to certain wisdom and choices that are increasingly counter-cultural or even odd in this day and age. However, odd is not as shameful as compared to what Christ endured for us. In our Asian context, shame drives us forcefully. Such shame entrenches structural sins we should contest against. I guess like Christ we can start by doing something small, and move forward from there on, and hopefully with God's grace, God's work will be done.

n Labour Day, I attended a Women's Day of Recollection, organised by the Woman to Woman Ministry of ICPE Mission Singapore. Prompted by a friend, I signed up for it without any expectations, as I had gone for retreats before and thought this would be similar. The Lord, however, decided to surprise me.

The retreat was a great reminder of the wonderful deeds that the Lord has worked in my life. Psalm 77:11 - 12 says, "I will call to mind the deeds of the Lord, I will remember your wonders of old. I will meditate on all Your works, and muse on Your mighty deeds." Indeed the Lord has done so much for me in these past years. From a person struggling with sin and shame, the Lord has shown me that His love is greater than my sins, and there is absolutely nothing that can separate me from the love of God. Just like when a candle is lit, no amount of darkness can overcome its light, so too no amount of sin can overcome the grace that the Lord has given each of us. For where sin abounded, grace abounded even more, when we experience God's forgiveness in the Sacrament of Reconciliation.

The story of Punchinello and the Wemmicks reminded me how I have often struggled with the wound of being not good enough. I was reminded to keep going back to my Creator, because His opinions are the only ones that matter. The stronger my prayer life and relationship with God is, the lesser opinions of other people toward me would matter, because my view would no longer be on earthly things, but on heavenly ones.

This retreat was also the first time I had been to an all-women's event. I am truly glad for the opportunity to share intimately in my sisters' journeys, struggles and hopes, and to claim our shared identity as princesses and daughters of our King. Just as the friends of the paralytic carried their friend to Jesus, there is power when women come together and carry each other to Jesus.

was looking for healing of my identity, when I heard about ICPE Woman to Woman Ministry. I chanced upon the Day of Recollection (DOR) held on Labour Day, on Facebook, and decided to sign up and obey God, despite initial reluctance because my pride was in the way as I thought I already know who Jesus is to me.

After attending DOR, I realised that I have to claim my identity in God, as his Beloved daughter.

Following up from DOR, I attended the sessions on Women in the Bible. It was on Fridays from 10 May to 14 June. Each session started with Praise and Worship, check in, followed by sharing from the speaker, then reflection, group sharing and ended with a closing prayer. Each week focusssed on a different woman from the bible.

DOR taught me the importance of trusting in God, and that He keeps His promises and will fulfil them in His time, just as how he kept His promise to Sarah, who had waited for 25 years before Isaac was born.

I also learnt the importance of having wisdom and courage like Queen Esther who spoke up to the King, for her people (the Jews) to prevent them from extermination. In Martha and Mary, I learnt that comparison will steal our joy, and God is at work in every story. And that Jesus is always accessible, and He listens to us if we approach Him. From Susanna, I learnt that God will help us through the impossibility of the situation, just like how He did for her when she was falsely accused of adultery and faced persecution, yet she placed her trust in Him.

Attending the weekly sessions has helped me to be more confident in my identity as God's beloved daughter, to continue to keep my gaze on Him and that it is more important to please God not man. I am reminded that God is bigger than my problems. There is a purpose for every struggle we go through, and we continue to work with God to discover the purpose.
