hen I see ants scurrying in my room or anywhere else, I can be sure it's a sign that they are looking for food. When I see birds perched on the branches, I know that they are keeping an eye on their next meal flying by. When I see that the forest is on fire, I dread to think that our homes are in danger.

Wisdom of Creation is about the wisdom to know that we are connected to the Web of Life, the theme for this year's celebration of the Season of Creation, which is supported by Pope Francis in the Laudato Si spirit of caring for our common home and a call for a conversion of our lifestyle. Perhaps, the words of Pope Francis will suffice to help us reflect on this. "A healthy relationship with creation is one dimension of overall personal conversion, which entails the recognition of our errors, sins, faults and failures, and leads to heartfelt repentance and desire to change." (Laudato Si, 218)

How can we respond? If there is any call to conversion and action that is urgent today — it is the call to account for our stewardship of the world and all of creation that has been entrusted to us. What is the state of the world today? If we were to do an external audit and give a report, surely we will get a serious "qualified report" with many alarm bells ringing. Extreme weather of record high temperatures around the world; unseasonal floodings in Japan and India; fires raging and burning up precious forests in the Amazon and in



the Arctic (unheard of), in California ... and even in Singapore where we are not spared of the climate change upheaval with prolonged dry spells and the threat of rising sea levels and the haze from burning forests in Indonesia.

What is our call to climate action? I remember a notice, when we rented a facility once — "Leave this place cleaner than when you first found it". It's a reminder of how we are to take care of our environment, our resources, and our earth so that when we leave this earth, we can be proud to say that, it will be a better place than when we first found it. Indeed, what is my legacy? How have I contributed to making our world a better place for the next generation inheriting it? What wisdom did I impart to them?

Wisdom is to know that we are stewards of God's creation, not its owners. Wisdom is to take what we need and leave more for others who do not have enough. Wisdom is to know that we are born into this world naked and will leave this world without taking a single cent with us.

The wisdom of each culture leaves us with some food for thought. Pope Francis reminds us, "The universe unfolds in God, who fills it completely. Hence, there is a mystical meaning to be found in a leaf, in a mountain trail, in a dewdrop, in a poor person's face. The ideal is not only to pass from the exterior to the interior to discover the action of God in the soul, but also to discover God in all things." (Laudato Si, 233).

This spirituality of Creation that Pope Francis speaks of is a call for action. "The best time to plant a tree is twenty years ago. The second best time is now." — Chinese proverb.

In St Ignatius Church, we have started the green movement to promote this awareness of our responsibility in making an impact with our actions no matter how small. It is a call for action to save the world and be partners of change. Act now before we regret later. Plant a tree now. Change your life now. Join our movement now. Live with gratitude now and life is ours!

he annual SEASON OF CREATION is celebrated by Christians all over the world from 1 September to 4 October. In a letter from the Vatican, Catholic churches have been invited to join in the celebration with the last Sunday of September set aside for the closing of the Year of Mission.

We are asked to celebrate our Creator and his Creation together in continual prayer, changes in the way we live and consume, hands-on action and even advocacy. Care and the protection of God's creation is part of our faith.

The theme "the Web of Life: Biodiversity as God's Blessing" connects our role as the stewards of God's creation with the urgent need to protect biodiversity.

The book of Genesis begins with God's affirmation that all of creation is "very good" (Genesis 1:30). We are part of a delicate and interdependent web of life, which is valuable because it is created, sustained and redeemed by God. We are called to reflect God's image through godly leadership within the community of fellow creatures (Genesis 1:26-28). The story of Noah includes God's redemptive purposes for, and covenant with humanity and the earth and all its creatures (Genesis 9:8-17). In the New Testament all things were created by and for Christ, giving particular value to each creature (Colossians 1:15-20). God's ultimate purposes

The Earth is full of Your creatures, and by Your wisdom you made them all. At Your word, the Earth brought forth plants yielding seed of every kind and trees of every kind bearing fruit, the waters teemed with swarms of living creatures of every kind, and the world was filled with every kind of winged bird; walking animal, and creatures that creep upon

During this Season of Creation, open our eyes to see the precious diversity that is all around us. Enlighten our minds to appreciate the delicate balance maintained by each creature. Inspire us to conserve the precious habitats that nurture this web of life.

from creation to re-creation encompass all that we call biodiversity.

Biodiversity matters not only because humans depend on stable and thriving ecosystems and the services they give to us, from clean water and food, to oxygen, clothing and climate regulation, and all the resources we use from nature. Biodiversity matters because God gives value to every creature that is created. As the Papal Encyclical Laudato Si states, "It is not enough, however, to think of different species merely as potential 'resources' to be exploited, while overlooking the fact that they have value in themselves ... Because of us, thousands of species will no longer give glory to God by their very existence, nor convey their message to us. We have no such right." (Laudato Si: On Care for our Common Home, 33).

Today, human behaviour is destroying God's creation at an unprecedented rate. According to the Living Planet Report 2018, there has been a 60 percent decline in global wildlife populations between 1970 and 2014, caused by deforestation, habitat destruction, climate change, and

pollution of soil, water and air, including the tide of plastic fouling the oceans.

This loss matters because all God's creatures have value in themselves and also as an issue of justice. It is the poor and marginalised who depend most immediately on the health of ecosystems and are affected most severely by the collapse of the natural systems that sustain all life. Billions today face the loss of productive soil, clean water, forests, fish and coral reefs, resulting in a great tide of human migration everywhere. Kenyan botanist and Christian Dr Stella Simiyu says, "The rural poor depend directly on the natural resource base. This is where their pharmacy is, this is where their supermarket is, this is in fact their fuel station, their power company, their water company. What would happen to you if these things were removed from your local neighbourhood? Therefore, we really cannot afford not to invest in environmental conservation."
