ast week, I watched a National Geographic documentary at my parents' house, which featured the nomadic lives of the people and animals of the Inner Mongolia grasslands. In that episode of 'Untamed China with Nigel Marven', Nigel visited the summer yurt of a Mongolian family. A yurt is a "portable, circular dwelling made of a lattice of flexible wood and covered in felt." In the course of Nigel's conversation with the young mother, she shared something that caught my attention, especially as we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family today. She said, "My wealth is not the number of sheep or horses out there on the grassland, but my family is my wealth!"

For those of you who have travelled to the grasslands of Inner Mongolia for your summer holidays, you would know very well that the wealth of a family there depends on the size of the herds. And for this young nomadic mother to make such an insightful remark about her family, we may want to pause and reflect on these words as we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family. I wonder how many of us can truly and sincerely profess "my family is my wealth"? The mother of this young nomadic family knows what makes life meaningful and worth living for, in spite of the harshness of life out there on the grasslands. For her, wealth is not the number of horses, yaks or sheep outside her summer yurt, but rather family togetherness, spending time in sharing and caring for each other, especially when life is tough particularly during wintertime. Nomadic families and their herds have to travel hundreds of miles during winter in search of pastures, so that they can make a decent living as

In these harsh condition, family members will need to work closely together and depend on each other for the survival of the family. Furthermore, all members of the family need to contribute to each other's wellbeing because survival on the grasslands will depend on the act of caring for the other. If we look at our comfortable life in Singapore, I wonder how we are caring for each other's wellbeing, let alone the survival of the family. But on the grasslands, it is a totally different matter altogether. We know that children need their parents' constant love and caring guidance to grow and come to maturity. And parents in turn need their children to help them of what it means to give unconditional love as parents. Perhaps too, parents can model themselves after Jesus' parents, Mary and Joseph, especially in the face of uncertainties and challenges in modern family life. The Holy Family has given us a good example of what it means to be a family, trusting and dependent on the providence of God.

In the coming days and with the dawn of a new year, you may want to take some time to reflect on what is truly important for you in your life and family's. Will you be able to say with sincerity of heart that "I am willing to place my family in the loving providence of God"? Put this into lovely action and give to your family an hour of undivided attention each day. I believe what you are about to profess, "My family is my wealth", will truly be meaningful to you and your family.

# Song of faith and humility — the Magnificat. "And Mary said: My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in GOD

"And Mary said: My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in GOD my Saviour, for He has looked with favour on the lowliness of His servant ... from now on, all generations will call me blessed; for the Mighty One has done great things for me, and holy is His Name."

Mary's soul magnifies the greatness of God. The word 'magnify' has several meanings, including to glorify or praise, or to enlarge. When Mary says, "My soul magnifies the Lord" and shares what God has done for her, our Blessed Mother is praising God and enabling others to see God's nature and character more clearly. Mary also magnifies the greatness of the Lord when she put others before self, by setting out in haste to a town in Judah, to be with Elizabeth. She thought of the needs of her cousin — to give Elizabeth the help that she needed.

Mary praises God for what the Lord had done for her personally – "He has looked with favour on the lowliness of His servant ... the Mighty One has done great things for me". It is important to remember that Mary was only a teenager. Yet she is focusing on God's blessings in her life, and in the great things He has done, and not the difficulties she would face in being faithful.

Mary praises God for what has been done for generations, and what the Lord will do in the future. Mary speaks of all these things as if they were already accomplished. God has shown strength, scattered the proud-hearted, brought down the powerful, filled the hungry and sent the rich away empty. The God who has been faithful in the past, will continue to be faithful in the future. Knowing who God is, Mary realizes that she has nothing to fear. We too have nothing to fear, because our GOD is mighty.

Mary's song challenges us to be honest with our values and desires. It As we celebrate the Solemnity of Mary, the Holy Mother of God on the first day of the new year, **Grace Low**, from Generation CHRIST! ministry holds up the humility, gratitude and faith of Our Mother as a model for us all

reminds us not to invest our lives merely in chasing material success or personal prestige. Mary says God is going to turn everything upside down. Rather than choosing the mighty and powerful, God picks the poor and lowly to bring about His plans. God reverses the wisdom of the world and makes His strength perfect in weakness.

In his encyclical, Ecclesia de Eucharista, the late Pope John Paul II devotes an entire chapter to Mary, calling her the "Woman of the Eucharist". Mary is sometime referred to as Our Lady of the Most Blessed Sacrament, as Pope John Paul II says, "Mary can take us by the hand and lead us to a closer relationship with the Eucharistic Christ ... By offering her womb for the Incarnation of God's Word, Mary lived her Eucharistic faith even before the institution of the Eucharist". St Augustine wrote, "Jesus took His Flesh from the Flesh of Mary". And St Padre Pio would sometimes say to his spiritual children, "Do you not see the Madonna always beside the tabernacle?"

When we go before Jesus in the Blessed Sacrament, we always find Him "with Mary His Mother", as the Magi did in Bethlehem. Mary is the first "adorer" of Jesus, and Christ in the Sacred Host, repeats to each of us what He said to the apostle John at Calvary, "Behold, your Mother".

Perhaps, it is for this reason that Marian shrines always foster devotion to the Holy Eucharist, so much so that they are often called Eucharistic shrines - be it in Lourdes or Fatima. In fact, most of the reported miraculous healings in Lourdes took place during the procession of the Blessed Sacrament. This is why Pope John Paul II says the **two pillars of our** Catholic Faith are the Holy Eucharist and our Lady. To understand the place of Mary in the celebration of Mass, we need to recall two fundamental principles. First, the Lord did not begin the work of redemption without Mary's "Yes". Likewise, He did not complete it on Calvary without her presence. The simple words of St John hold significant meaning, "Near the Cross of Jesus, stood His Mother".

Mary's song teaches us to live for what really matters, so that God might use us for His purposes and glory. Mary is an example of Humility, Gratitude and Faith. If we do very ordinary things with humility, gratitude and generosity – that is how we give God the opportunity to be magnified and proclaimed – by letting God's greatness shine through us.

Let us reflect on the great things God has done in our lives – how do we magnify the Lord in return? Let us ask the Holy Spirit to fill us with the same love and worship of God that was in Mary's heart. And may we offer our souls and bodies, like Mary did, to serve GOD, not as begrudging servants, but as those who can join our Blessed Mother in her joyful acclamation: "My soul magnifies the Lord, and my spirit rejoices in GOD my Saviour".
