n Matthew's Gospel today, Jesus has a greater discourse on the law, compared to Luke (Lk16:16-18). Though Jesus denies divorce, a caveat exists – "unless [the marriage] is unlawful". (Mt 19:9) Matthew was responding to the evangelical need of the early Christians who were Jewish converts and Gentiles, and his discourse on the law and prophets is part of a greater move to help unify the Christians, as well as to have a common understanding about the way to salvation.

Though laws are necessary, a life defined by law alone seems incomplete, even bare. Just as a sacrament dictated only by liturgical rubrics seems dry (rubrics that spell out the necessary, but in effect are also the minimum), Christians live life as full as anyone else. This means with affection, with friends and families (and all that lie in-between), with all the messiness and scruffiness that life throws up in our way.

No matter which country we are in, or ethnic group we belong to, in God's eyes, we are God's people, and will be judged accordingly. That's not to say that we deserve judgment, but rather that we are loved enough to be considered seriously by God. As such, on no uncertain terms are we going to be measured up as Christians. We are told what we are judged on. That is only fair and loving, for no one wants to feel as if they are living under a microscope, especially if God is wielding the microscope.

Indeed, Matthew's Gospel reaffirmation of what Mark's Gospel mentions about love of God and love of neighbour as one's self (Mk 12:28-31) – that "the whole law and the prophets depend on these two commandments" (Mt 22:40) – is really an assurance to the Israelites that their ethnicity is not aberrant nor con-

trary to being Christians. Neither should we use the differences of ethnicity – or in the modern age, nationality – to paint broadly against those whom we don't yet know as neighbours.

Yet Matthew's Gospel readings indicate to us that our socio-political context matters in being Christian, because it shapes our actions and thinking. Hence, chapters 5 to 7 of Matthew's Gospel included many references to what was happening in Israel at that time. It mattered to Jesus, hence the commentaries on the socio-political practices - today's Gospel makes that abundantly clear. While we have some commonalities with the Israelites - swearing is what it is, how we are Christians in our own homes, communities, public spaces and civil society matters more. If we look at ourselves, and ask how like Christ are we today, would we like the answer, or even not want to answer at all?

Being like Christ is not a formula safely kept hidden like the recipe for Coca-Cola; nor is it unmalleable like the periodic table. The wisdom that the rest of today's readings speak of hints at an ageless treasure that continues in all ages. For us Catholics, that is the *kerygma*, the kernel of faith transmitted through all ages. This kernel resists our formulation and static binding of it, just like the inspiring Word of God. In fact, we

struggle with the formulations, because our world is changing.

Change, though unsettling, is a reality we live and have to thrive in. Hence, the post-synodal apostolic exhortation *Querida Amazonia* (http://w2.vatican. va/content/francesco/en/apost_exhortations/documents/papa-francesco_esortazione-ap_20200202_querida-amazonia.html) is of great interest and provoked reactions from those who endeavored to make themselves heard loudly. My friend and fellow student Gus Hardy wrote a quick review which seemed fair and I find agreeable (https://www.facebook.com/gus.hardy.73/posts/10217117559835354).

More importantly is that we try to read it for ourselves. Our own reading is important. This is a crucial part of the synodal process that Pope Francis encourages us all to take part in. All of us are the Church – not just those in Rome, or those serving the lay, or theology students or professors. In reading, in engaging with the world around us meaningfully as a result of it – whether in our actions or our influence in leadership positions – the *kerygma* of our faith is enlivened, made alive, vital and engaged.

Clearly, tradition remains important - the law and the prophets are to be fulfilled by Christians, just as Christ did. However, what did Christ really do? He loved unconditionally - just as God continues to love us unconditionally, as God provides for us absolution of our sins through confession, and thus reconciling with not only God but also our community. God loves us unconditionally, such that we can always approach him in the sacrament of the Eucharist, prepared in ways not meant to burden or obstruct, but fosters a really good and heartfelt relationship with him. To do as Christ did - do we really know, or have we just not been attentive?

Re: Our Response in Faith in Times of Crisis

In the midst of this present COVID-19 crisis, we may be consumed by fear and worries that sap our peace of mind and our faith. In fact, it is in such times that God invites us to turn to Him with all our heart and mind.

I believe we can take away a simple lesson – to respect life and God's Creation and creatures, and not "consume animals that are unclean". We do so at our own peril as we have already seen the consequences when we buy and eat animals that are infested with deadly viruses and bacteria.

Some scientists have identified the carriers of the COVID-19 to animals like snakes and civet cats, and even monkeys, among others. The Leviticus 11:1-23 and Deuteronomy 14: 3-21 texts contain examples of what is forbidden for us. This law is applicable to everyone, not just to the Jews. We need to practise prudence and realise that "while God created everything good, not everything is good for us to eat". Let us be more mindful and respectful of not stepping over the boundaries. We sin because of disobedience and pride. Let us repent by returning to God and make amends for our wickedness.

What can we do? While it is not a good idea to come together and be physically present to pray and support each other, we can still be together in the spirit to pray in common for all who have caught the virus, as well as the health care workers and all staff at the forefront of the battle to contain the disease.

I propose that we as a Christian community, be united together in prayer as well as fasting. I invite everyone to pray individually or as a family and join in this intercessory prayer every day at 12pm beginning this Monday 17 February for at least Nine days, ending on Ash Wednesday (which is a day of fast).

For fasting, I propose that we fast on Wednesdays and Fridays, asking God to help us stop the spread of the virus and to bring an end to this outbreak.

I also suggest we pray the Rosary, the prayer to Archangel Michael and a Glory be at 12 pm daily.

May Mother Mary pray and intercede for us with Jesus our Lord and Saviour. Amen.
