Gospel reading oday's (Matt 4:1-11) shows а certain parallel with the two chapters of Genesis in our first reading as Jesus responds to what the Father and Spirit communicate to Him at His Baptism: Jesus takes a very humble but positive attitude before the Father's love and gifts, not at all what Adam chooses in his innocence and immaturity.

The fact that Jesus appears at the Jordan seems to be the trigger for the Father's proclamation of "This is My Beloved Son. Listen to Him". It is also a trigger for the Spirit to drive Jesus out into a deserted place, where He fasts and prays for a very extended period (the "forty days" is more symbolic than literal). Notice that His response is fasting and prayer, a retreat, a time set aside from every other concern, a withdrawal from comfort and distractions, an exclusive focusing on the things of God. Philippians 2:5-11 is most apropos here: Jesus is most definitely not Adam.

I would not take the mention of "the tempter" here to mark the actual presence of Satan; the Greek root of that word equally means "to test", and I would say rather that Jesus is trying to discern (and for Jesuits that is the critical word) just who He is, and just what it is that the Father and the Spirit are calling Him to be and do. He does this by what Jesuits call "testing the spirits", considering the various "temptations" or motions in His human heart. Even Jesus spent time in prayer and fasting to be in constant communion with Their love and Their desires for Him.

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what Just were those "temptations"? First there is the suggestion that Jesus take relief from His hungers in a material way, letting stones become His bread. This would be a major deviation from finding all things in God and God in all things (more Jesuit ideas), absolute trust that His Father would not only provide all that He needed on His mission, but in an appropriate manner and at the very right moment. Do we come anywhere near living that stance, as we pray to do in the Lord's Prayer?

The second temptation, throwing Himself down from the Temple heights, is a call to flashy and ultimately pointless action. Do we serve God in the hidden little ways, at every single moment, in every particular situation, or only in those high profile places when we are being pointedly religious? Do we find God – and respond to Him – only in the ways that He rescues us, or is He also present to us even in the most mundane parts of our lives: getting dressed, walking down the street, opening the mail, meeting people in a supermarket, and all the little seemingly "empty" places in our days?

Christ's third temptation is to power and prestige. He faces what we all do: as humans we will never really possess power in the world nor all the safety, strength, and happiness that wealth seems to offer since we are and always will be at the mercy of aging, microbes, and our need for air, food, and sleep. The Kingdom which God offers us is eternal and true and takes care of all our needs ... if we are willing to enter it through His narrow door.

Let us join Jesus in His fasting and His discernment of the true will and love of the Father active in our lives, and we can trust that God and His angels will constantly minister to us if we let them. Let us make Lent a time of joyful and godly growth in the Spirit.
