Transfiguration An Encounter with the Divine Presence

ometimes, I wonder what it would be like to meet God in my life? I would have three questions for him. The first is "Why did you have to create mosquitoes?" (I have a long standing war with them — they are not exactly my favourite insects!). Question 2, "Why is it that so many people cannot stand the sight of each other (i.e. they hate each other) when you can love us regardless?" And the third question, "When are you going to get rid of the COVID-19 Virus?"

Well, I am not sure if God will grant me an audience, let alone give me an answer. But frankly speaking, I don't think I am ready to meet God yet — I am too busy getting ready for the resumption of Masses. And when will the official announcement by the Archbishop be? Only he knows. We still live in hope. As one parishioner shared, "We wait in obedience". It is so insightful to see this period of Lent as a time of patient waiting and waiting in obedience even as we are thirsty and hungry for the Eucharist. Indeed, we are fasting even from Holy Communion to strengthen our faith and disciple our bodies to battle sin in our lives. Indeed, we can identify with these words: "Your endurance will win you your lives." (Lk 21:19).

I have come to the realization that

our lives are centred around the desire to see God. Our souls, being made for God, long to encounter Him. What is deepest in us is also truest. Sometimes we feel a bit lost and listless in the desert. We are made for God and our soul is orientated and drawn to Him like a homing pigeon flying in the wilderness on its way home. In these recent days, many of us feel like we are accompanying the Lord in His forty days and nights, fasting and praying in the wilderness. Sometimes we feel a bit lost and listless in the desert.

While we have that eternal longing in our heart for God, we know that humanly we will not be able to see Him face to face in this life. There is long-held Judaic understanding that no one can see the face of God and live. This simply points to the mystique of God who is All Powerful (Omnipotence) and All Present (Omniscience). In all humility, we have to recognise that we are creatures and not the Creator. We cannot and dare not look directly at the "fire of love", coming from the Burning Bush, lest we die of shock or be blinded. A simple analogy is that no one can look directly into the Sun without risking blindness and damage to the eye. The light that emanates from God is certainly more powerful than that of the Sun. Indeed, Moses

in his encounter with the Lord God Yahweh in the Burning Bush, not only was he asked to take off his shoes, he also "covered his face for he was afraid to look at God". (Ex 3:6)

We have a similar gospel reading for the Second Sunday of Lent to remind us of the transfiguration of Our Lord and Peter's uncharacteristic response to it. "It is wonderful for us to be here; if you wish, I will make three tents here, one for you, one for Moses, and one for Elijah." (Mt 17:4). I am not sure if I will trust a fisherman to become a builder of tents, especially as Peter had often proven himself capable of being impulsive in his responses without thinking things over first.

Foolish as Peter may look to us, his response was an instinctive act of faith before the presence of the Divine. He too had to take off his shoes of ignorance, of fear and presumption. The best attitude to have before the Divine Presence is to bow down in reverential silence and holy solitude. We wait in obedience too for Our Lord to finish His prayer, touch us and say, "Stand up and do not be afraid". With Jesus by our side, we need not to be afraid, for all fears are gone and faith returns!
