Psalm response: *This is the day that the Lord has made. Let* us rejoice and be glad!

esus Christ, the innocent victim of our sinful society and of our personal guilt, is a love so strong that even death does not hold Him back from us and from continuing His loving work. The Christ who was quite publicly and violently put to death is alive and at work in the world right now, and in every place and situation.

And we are witnesses, not to the empty tomb like Peter and the others, for we have never seen it, but witnesses to the fact that Jesus has indeed risen and is actually alive in the world, and still going about bringing His Kingdom into visible life. Where we have seen Christ alive and continuing His mission is in those we truly respect - and also even at work in us.

What do we witness to in our lives at this time in the world's history and for the small circle of people that we affect? And how do we do that witnessing? We simply do what we can to live and act like our Master: as well as we can. We love as He does because He has appeared in our lives, spoken to us, and called us to follow Him, learn from Him, and serve Him as He establishes Kingdom and through us. Our witnessing is Jesus alive and at work in us - but only to the extent that we trust Him and let Him direct our values, our hearts, our hopes, and the actions we choose to take in this light.

Christ is our Way to the Father, our unique Way. Think of Him as a bridge across a tremendous chasm, such as the one He

mentions in the parable of Lazarus and the rich man (Luke 16:19-31). His

He is also the Way in being a pattern for us, the model for how to be human in the best way, for while He sits at the Father's right hand since the Ascension, He is also here on Earth, in the Eucharist and in

To enter upon the Way, people need to see Jesus in us since He is not visible in Himself. Others can ordinarily find Christ in us if we witness to Him by our actions, by our values and our principles, and by our words. This is much more than simple politeness, more than the sort of service that gains us admiration in our community; it is living a radical hope in God: we act lovingly in season and out, not out of our wealth, but habitually even in our poverty, trusting in God to back us up in whatever way He deems best.

And so today we celebrate and proclaim Jesus, who is indeed the Christ: He is God's Anointed, the Messiah who has accomplished the work that His Father gave Him to do and is now in/with/through us to share His loving – and just as He affects us by His loving and active presence, we affect others. We reveal the living and risen Christ, for we are His Mystical Body in the world. In our seeming emptiness we are witnesses that there is a fullness of life not evident in this world's eyes, but nonetheless totally real.

We are indeed His witnesses, and the Greek word for that is "martyr", which in English means one who dies for a cause or a person: let us die to ourselves that we might indeed rise with Jesus. Let Him be alive and at work not only in the world right now and in every place and situation, let Him be alive in us.


