oday's passage from Peter's first letter is speaking of the ultimate part of our being united to Christ, the highest form that it might take, short of what our life will be like in heaven.

A basic way of following Christ is simply becoming a Christian, having faith in Him and seeking to grow in that faith by obeying the commandments, ridding ourselves of our more obvious faults, getting in some prayer: basic. It is approximately equal to John's baptism and all that some people do or can do. The negative side of this can be because it is not hard, because it is the path of least resistance in our family and in our culture.

Some, more profoundly moved by faith, try to do what Christ does: trying to heal others, to form a community of love, and to care for those who are in any sort of need or who suffer injustice. The negative side here is that this gives us a good feeling, is visible, and gives us a good reputation: what is our real motivation here?

Still better is working hard at our personal perfection and spiritual life, learning to follow the Holy Spirit in big and little things. Even here there is a negative side: this can be a source of pride and of disdain for others and is filled with traps. Read the Screwtape Letters by C.S. Lewis to see some of the dangers at this level of following Christ.

Then there is suffering injustice in the name of Christ and for Christ, beyond reason or awareness of our own desires and safety. Peter refers to it here as "the Holy Spirit has come to REST on you." And here too we face dangers: do we really do it for Him? Or do we use it as proof that we are holy? Do we seek to suffer simply for the reputation of holiness? Do we do it because it makes us feel holy? Rare, but it happens. And too often "justice" is what I think I deserve, so this suffering can be a complete lie and a delusion.

We might describe this same passage as our growth in love, our seeking to be identified with Christ instead of merely serving Him: "I no longer call you servants but friends." This identification with Christ means entering into His passion so as to enter His Resurrection.

I might need to point out that we are never simply on only one of these steps: as in the process of maturing, we can be living on several steps at once, sometimes even seemingly moving backwards.

The question is whether we have any awareness of what we are doing, what we are trying to do, whether we make any progress and seek for higher things.

And do we press on, trusting God, in spite of the dangers, traps, and diversions?

In today's Gospel, Christ sends us into the world and prays for us, not just because of the exterior problems that we will have, but also because of the problems that we will face in staying really faithful to Him as we grow in the faith through its various stages and move towards a real spiritual maturity.

All of this will move us into the life of the Trinity because we are now so like Christ and have had the same experiences.
