he daily readings leading up to this Sunday have pointed to God's justice, generosity, and mercy. Evildoers are dealt with justly, in readings from Monday to Wednesday, as well as Saturday. Prevailing mercy and solidarity closes the distance between heaven and earth most explicitly in Thursday's readings. In all the readings, God's judgment is not an end in itself, but aims to nurture and give life, where judgment is an expression of God's power and agency. To what end?

In the current pandemic that the US is weathering badly, there doesn't seem to be a clear outcome that could entail God. At least there's an awakening about racism, structural and personal, stories that you'd think belong to the 19th century – until you realize that you too might have been racist or oppressive in some manner in your life, especially when stereotyping people.

In an irretrievable past, I might have recounted previously of finding myself seated alone in a section of empty pews, only to be surprised as migrants filled them. It was an accidental public social action, one that inspired at least another churchgoer to switch seats in solidarity not only with me, but with these fellow faithful who happen to look different, though still Catholic, still human.

Certainly, God can make straight lines with crooked ones, but even the pandemic tests the faithful, and more so those without faith, with incredibly challenging dangers and debilitating change. Nothing can nor should stay the same. If this is not a message writ large that humanity is not God, let me know otherwise. This epochal period is

a liminal space, between what has been, and what is to come. Not surprisingly, revolutionaries and mystics emerge from such spaces.

Revolutionaries have strategically agitated and created inconvenience to those in power until the voiceless and social hunger for justice are heeded, such as Mahatma Gandhi, Martin Luther King Jr, or even the biography of Buddha (without reference to Buddhism itself). Mystics who turned to God amidst crises and challenges in their times, creatively birthed new spirituality in response to serious problems in society or in their own personal lives, as St Francis of Assisi and St Ignatius of Loyola had witnessed.

Clearly, anxiety overshadows such liminal spaces, where unknown and hence untrustworthy elements are in play. The resulting reactive differences and disunity when resolving this liminal space exemplify a mistrust in the other. The science fiction movie Arrival (2016) builds from that theme. In order to achieve solidarity with the other, a belief in something or someone other than our abilities and knowledge, is necessary. This belief is often not a guarantee, but a hope in the good of the other.

We don't simply trust in strangers, and also God, if we don't know them. However, today's readings emphatically declares how we can definitely trust in God. Today we hear and read who God is – universally caring, able to make things happen, fair but also capable of tough love, yet unrelentingly kind and merciful, especially given how often Moses successfully bargained with God for his people.

The Holy Spirit is always accompanying and inspiring us –

helping us see straighter lines among the crooked ones in our lives, or see the straight in all lines. To do so is to be transcendent, to know beyond just ourselves. Prayer is a good exercise of transcendence, a dialogue with God who is utterly beyond us, yet incarnate through and around us in the world, uniting all things, time and space.

Recognizing each other human alike, with very human needs and desires, is only the first step of understanding, leading to knowing, trusting, and accepting the other like ourselves. Beyond what Jesus asks of us, I hope we will live out God's will for us, united as one, like at a great wedding feast. There, joyful for and with each other for the united Bride and Bridegroom not only at the eschaton, but also as so desperately needed in this liminal space, might we fulfill our baptismal promises as daughters and sons of God.

The ICPE Woman to Woman (W2W) ministry held a 10-week module on "Finding Your Personal Vocation". Valerie Tan shares her reflections

Who am I? Why am I here? How shall I lead my life? What shall I do? Why?

You may have, at some point, asked these questions of yourself. Do you believe that there is an answer? How important is that answer to you? Why?

In my early twenties, I became interested in the concept of vocation, God's call for me. I was very keen to

do the right thing, so I sought to learn more about discernment in order not to make irredeemable life choices that would conflict with God's will. I was surprised to learn that the primary

purpose of discernment is not so much about understanding what God wants me to do, as it is about developing my understanding of who God is, and my relationship with Him. When we get to know a person, we start to understand how he or she thinks. When I know that this person has my interests at heart, I start to trust him and his words. When I fall deeply in love with him, I want him to be able to fulfill the longings of his heart, and I do what it takes for that to happen. Hence, understanding what God wishes for us to do is simply a byproduct of knowing Him, experiencing His love for us, and falling deeply in love with Him; Him who loves us absolutely.

Thinking myself very wise and enlightened, I didn't expect to learn much more from this module of personal vocation with the ICPE W2W ministry. But our infinite God had a surprise in store for the finite me. I should've known. Really!

The most important thing that God revealed to me was my lack of trust in Him. As part of the module, a one-on-

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one sharing session with an ICPE team member helped me to realise that, even though I often ponder the questions of vocation, I didn't really want to hear an answer anymore, because I didn't trust God. I didn't trust that He had my interests at heart, and I was deeply afraid of the trials and sufferings that God's disciples endure when carrying out His mission. Uncovering this was the first step in enabling me to address the false image of God which I unconsciously had, and to acknowledge my fears so as to enter into a deeper

level of trust that my loving Father was inviting me to.

Having asked the question of "Who is God", I was in a better place to seek an answer to the second part of the question

that is also embedded in the search for our personal vocation: Who am I?. The search for our personal vocation can be also understood as the question: Who does God call me to be, and hence what does He call me to do?. Answering this requires us to also answer the questions: Who is this God, and who is this me? Over the course of 8 weeks, we went through many exercises to reflect on who God created each of us to be. One that struck me was a simple reflection on the qualities I liked about Jesus. I was surprised to learn that the qualities I liked about Jesus could reflect the qualities I had in me.

The 8 weeks of reflection culminated in a Day of Recollection, where we looked back on all our reflections to identify the common thread that has been weaving tirelessly in each of our life stories. You see, our call had already been given to us even before we began searching for it. It had been given to us even before we were born – nay, conceived! The words God spoke to the prophet Jeremiah are also meant for us: "Before I formed you in





the womb I knew you; before you came to birth I consecrated you; I appointed you as prophet to the nations." (Jer 1:5).

Thus the understanding of our personal vocation is not so much about sending messages to a faraway God, and deciphering the encrypted message that He may or may not send to us in a green glass bottle that we have to trawl the oceans for. No, it is much more about going as deeply and as authentically as you can into the depths of your heart, and listening to it. Listening to it to hear the call that God has already gently whispered to you, and continues to reveal to you, day after day, that soon you may not just live unconsciously with it, but more and more fully from it.
