Psalm response: O God, let all the nations praise you!

esus lived in a time of great cultural and religious diversity, and the Jews of His time tried valiantly to hold on to their identity in this situation. Keeping the Law and its strictures, and doing everything in a "kosher" manner, guaranteed that they were being faithful to God in a visible and measurable way. It is similar to attitudes alive in the Church even today.

We might keep that in mind as we consider today's Gospel (Matt 15:21-28). On the surface it appears that Jesus treats this pagan woman badly, but it is in the middle of a passage where He deals with pagans quite a bit. After walking on water (Matt 14:22-33), He goes to Gennesaret apparently to heal pagans; it is all that He does there. Then the Pharisees attack Jesus and He explains what

truth and cleanliness ("kosher") actually are, a matter of the heart rather than what passes into the sewer. Next comes this healing of a pagan woman's daughter.

We also remember that He heals the Samaritan leper ("Were not ten made clean?", Luke 11-19) and the centurion's son (certainly a foreigner, one who maintains Roman power over Israel, Matt 8:5-13), and He also uses a heretic in the parable of the Good Samaritan (Luke 10:30-37).

The point is that Jesus is nowhere near as negative about pagans as today's Gospel text seems to indicate. We need to remember that Jesus is a teacher, and He treats this woman with a certain respect calling her to confess her faith in Him.

As always, the question is how this

applies to us. Because of our sins we are not pure and holy, but are distant from God, at least partially by our own choice, yet that does not mean that we are not loved.

We do need to work at eliminating sin from our lives, but that should not be our principal focus. What is far more effective than that eradication is the positive work which we do to develop the virtues, and our concrete and personal practice of love and encouragement. Working on those virtues and practices, which are the opposite of our sins and failings, is actually far more effective than simply scratching and scraping away at what we want to remove from our lives. It puts a healthy life where there is decay and death, and that simply gives such things less hold on us. Working directly on our sins and focusing exclusively on them can give us the impression that we can achieve holiness on our own, that we can make ourselves lovable to God, but that is a pagan attitude. God loves us, and if we try to live in His grace we can trust Him to take care of our sin and guilt (consider the Pharisee and the Publican in the Temple, Luke 18:9-14).

Like this woman we also need to practise insistent prayer; Jesus Himself spoke of the unjust judge (Luke 18:1-8).



thought I'd never encounter again. Yet there's the danger of not recognizing the old terrors that still exist versus those that are hidden, unrecognized or disenfranchised, as racism, and other prejudices cloud our reason and sight. Yes, it will all pass, but because even death is given a new meaning by the Holy Spirit that continues to live in all living things. With the reduction of all human activity, it could be a cooler summer. A poorer place to be, as the very rich get richer, for sure.

Maybe this is a time for a socio-cultural revolution, seeing that there are so many inequalities in society now, so many unnecessary sacrifices of our time that so diminished our famílies and relationships. We don't have to go back to those old systems. Those video chats, telephone calls, letters and other means of communication should continue and enrich our in person communication.

> We need to live through this as if we're now in a new normal, a normal where we should try to choose to live more humanely as much as possible. It is possible if all of us believe and want the same thing. It is possible when we know what we want, or at least what we don't want. We might not be dreaming when this new world, in the midst of very painful labour pains, eventually, slowly, emerges.

Will we know ourselves better then? I hope so. I hope people take the trouble to write diaries, journals, any records of their thoughts now, so that they have signposts for the future. This future is ours. Let us not lose hope, sight, nor each other, as far as we can.
