LENT: Both Time And Space

s we begin the forty days of Lent where we pray, fast and seek to spread God's mercy in whatever way that we can, I'd like to suggest a slightly different perspective that may give us new insights and experiences in

our preparation for the Paschal Triduum. More often than not, we focus on Lent as a period of time, within which we intensify our spiritual practices. Sometimes, we start these practices with great zeal, but enthusiasm wanes as the days go by, and we begin to ask ourselves, "When is Lent going to end?" While it's true that Lent is definitely seen as a time period (Lent in Latin is *quadragesima*, meaning "fortieth"), can there be another way of looking at it?

There is definitely a need for us to prepare for the Paschal Triduum, opening our hearts and minds for the commemoration of the passion, death and resurrection of Christ. It's a privileged time to slow down and turn our focus to the Lord, but I feel that we lose something if we see it only as a fixed time period. Time passes and as we move into other seasons, there's a possibility that our spiritual growth and the graces received during Lent can become but memories as we move into more exciting and less penitential activities. However, if we made a little change to our perspectives and saw Lent less as a time period and more of a space that is open before us, and in

which we are invited to enter, we may also feel a shift in our response to the Lord.

The Gospel reading for the first Sunday of Lent is always an account of Jesus going into the wilderness and the temptations that occur there. And quite often, we focus on the time that he spent there, which was not coincidentally, forty days. The number forty is definitely significant, being the number of days of the flood and the number of years the Israelites spent in the wilderness, but what about the wilderness itself? Jesus was led by the Spirit into the wilderness, a space that must have felt forbidding and empty, but it was this same space that allowed him to feel the full extent of his humanity in such a way that he could empathise with us, the people whom he came to save. I feel this is the same for us - Lent is a space for us to explore the full extent of our humanity, in all its joys and sorrows, triumphs and difficulties.

Images help, and I'd like to use two images to help us conceive of Lent as a space: that of the wilderness and of an entrance hallway or area. Going into the wilderness can be scary, especially for many of us who grew up in urban Singapore. The fear of the unknown can be part of that, but the unfamiliarity of the environment and the feeling of vulnerability of being just a mere human at the mercy of the elements. While these fears are real, going into the wilderness, both literally and spiritually, can have the effect of allowing us to examine ourselves more thoroughly, seeing where our fears come from and recognising our need for the Lord in all things as we experience our own vulnerability. Journeying with Christ into the wilderness during Lent need not be scary because we know that he accompanies us even in these difficult periods, helping us to shine the light on the areas of our lives that are most in need of his love and mercy.

The other image of an entrance hallway is less daunting. Many flats and houses here have a small area where guests can remove and store their shoes, pausing before entering the rest of the home. It's a ritual we're very familiar with – wiping our footwear on the doormat, entering the hallway, removing our shoes or sandals and placing them on a rack. These hallways are places of transition, a separation between the outside and inside of the home, a space where we prepare ourselves to receive the welcome that is promised. This preparation is necessary because we don't want to barge into the home as ungracious guests and the time taken to prepare allows us to appreciate the hospitality more fully. It's the same with us, and the Paschal Triduum. We don't want to barge into the most important liturgies of the year without proper preparation and so Lent provides us with the requisite space within which we can fully prepare for our commemoration of Christ's salvific actions.

I feel that by looking at Lent both temporally and spatially, we can prepare more fully for what is to come, journeying with the Lord into ourselves and as well towards him always. To support this process of preparation, Kingsmead Centre is offering an online Lenten retreat that will look at Lent in the light of both time and space. Details of the retreat can be found below.


