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## Trust in the Good Shepherd



he image of the Good Shepherd has always appealed to me, but as I learned more about what a shepherd was and did in New Testament times, my understanding of the image which Christ uses in today's Gospel reading shifted rather noticeably. I realized that shepherds were at the bottom of the scale when it came to respect and income, and I was especially struck by the fact that these men raised the sheep in their charge only to sell them for food or for sacrifice. This did not enhance my vision of the Good Shepherd.

Christ clearly indicates that some owners of sheep hired others to care for their flocks, men who became shepherds only because of what they could get out of it, men who were liable to abandon their charges when there was a threat.

What Christ proclaims here is that He is actually the opposite of all such shepherds: He is the shepherd who goes lovingly after the one who is lost, leaving the ninety-nine to care for themselves for a moment (*Matthew* 18:24; *Luke* 15:3-7). He has chosen His sheep, and He leads to life, not death, those who are willing to truly choose Him as their shepherd. His sheep do not die, for it is rather He who gives Himself to death in order that His flock might live.

Sheep in general are not very intelligent at all and need a caretaker, a leader, a protector – in short, a shepherd. That applies to us as well: when it comes to what is really for our good, we act only too often like children who want immediate gratification, who follow nothing more than their own hungers and desires. And like children, we need to be rescued and returned to a right relationship with our families and our communities. We are then very much like those sheep.

Those of us who want to follow Jesus, who wish to be with Him wherever He takes us, trust Him to lead us to real life and its fullness through all the dangers we think we face and all the doubts we suffer. We pray that we may truly hear and recognize His voice. Psalm 23 truly means something to us, and we follow not only out of need, but out of a love, a yearning, to be always with a Shepherd whom we have come to understand and value even a little.

Jesus lives His life as the Good Shepherd at His Father's invitation, but freely: this is obedience, not forced, regretful, restrained, or blind, but free and loving. Jesus loves the Father, and He loves us, the sheep of His flock. His obedience is strictly a matter of passionate love for both the Father and us.

We can put our independence in the hands of Jesus, giving up our absolute self-direction, our self-sufficiency, and confidently let ourselves be led, fed, guided, protected, and above all, loved by a Good Shepherd like Him. Or we can childishly decide that we are all grown up and don't need God's concern and care for us, that we can do very well without His love and protection.

If we choose the former path, God might then work to make us shepherds in His own image, as the Father is, as Jesus is, and as the Spirit is, each in his or her own way.

My RCIA journey began in September 2020 when I was alone in Singapore. My husband and 3 children are already baptised except for myself. I didn't tell my husband who was in Jakarta at the time about my joining RCIA. I could only depend on Father Colin, my facilitators Anthony and Pao Yi to guide me during our ZOOM sessions. I would go to church with my family, hear all the Bible readings and homily, but never really listened. My husband called us "submarine Catholics" who only attend church on Christmas and Good Friday. I asked many silly questions at the beginning because there were so many Bible readings which I didn't understand at all. But I did memorize all the prayers which Father Colin told us to. When I was presented with a Catholic Bible on my Rite of Acceptance, I was at a loss to how to start with such a thick volume of more than 1,400 pages. But our RCIA sessions twice a week have taught me more and more, and I began to understand more of the Bible passages and different





readings from the prophets, Jesus' disciples and definitely all of Father Colin's homilies. I'm so blessed that God gives me this opportunity to be guided by Father Colin, Anthony and Pao Yi, and my group for walking this journey.
