









5 Love Languages on Mother's Day



n his book "The Five Love Languages: How to Express Heartfelt Commitment to Your Mate", Dr Gary Chapman lists the five love languages — words of affirmation, physical touch, acts of service, receiving gifts and spending quality time together.

One wonders how Dr Chapman arrived at his five love languages. Did he observe how couples interacted, or interviewed them? Did he base it on his own personal experiences? Or perhaps it was a combination of all of the above. Whatever methodology Chapman used in deriving these five love languages, I believe this valuable and practical knowledge has helped countless couples, parents, family members, as well as friends to better appreciate and improve their interpersonal relationships. What is worth remembering is that the way you would like to receive the love language will be the way you express or show your love to another, according to Dr Chapman.

For example, if you feel that love should manifest more in deeds than in words, you will probably express love through your deeds, like doing household chores for your wife, as an expression of your love for her. On the other hand,

your wife may prefer kind words of affirmation from you rather than you doing household chores. Words of affirmation being her love language will be much more meaningful and memorable to her than acts of loving service.

today's Gospel, expresses the love of the Father through these words of affirmation, "As the Father has loved me, so I have loved you. Remain in my love. If you keep my commandments you will remain in my love, just as I have kept my Father's commandments and remain in his love." More importantly, Jesus showed the depth of the Father's love by offering his life for us on the Cross, while we were still sinners. This act of love is beautifully captured in Jesus' commandment, "Love one another, as I have loved you. A man can have no greater love than to lay down his life for his friends." And he concretely lived this one commandment of love by dying on the Cross for us, his friends.

This act of love can also be seen when family members offer their own vital organs, like liver, kidney, or bone marrow to another family member who is in need of a transplant. The self-giving of one to another is one of the highest acts of kindness and love shown to

another person. Parents, especially mothers, will never hesitate to do that for their children. Take a moment and reflect on this act of love given freely from one person to another. Will you do the same for a loved one in need? I believe you will, without any hesitation!

Turn your attention now to what happens at the Eucharistic celebration, where ordinary bread and wine are transformed into the body and blood of Christ through the grace of the Holy Spirit, nothing more and nothing less. The Eucharist is the greatest of all the love languages, where the Son of God, Jesus Christ gives himself completely to us in the form of the consecrated host at Holy Communion, so that we who receive Him may have life and have it to the fullest. Jesus is offering not only words of affirmation in John's gospel today. He continues to give himself to us at every Eucharistic celebration, so that we may have eternal life.

Today, as we celebrate Mother's Day, I trust the five love languages may be helpful as you deliberate what to say, do or give to your beloved mother and grandmother. Do you know what the love language of your mother or grandmother is? If you don't,

now is the time to find out what really makes them happy, and what can bring smiles to their faces and joy to their hearts.

Last Sunday, when I went home in the late morning after Sunday Mass, I brought some lovely purple orchids for the home altar. When my mom, who is in her 80s saw them, she was so happy. Before the COVID-19 pandemic, she would regularly buy beautiful fresh flowers for the home after Sunday Mass. But due to the pandemic, she had to stay at home on Sunday instead of going to the market for her fresh flowers. Thus, for my mother, her love language is doing acts of service, besides words of affirmation and physical touch. Who says you can only have one love language? I think each one of us may have one primary love language, and perhaps one or even two secondary ones.

Finally, I would like to highlight these beautiful words of Jesus in today's gospel, "You did not choose me: no, I chose you; and I commissioned you to go out and to bear fruit, fruit that will last." It is very reassuring to know that our faith is not only what we have chosen and committed ourselves to, since faith is also a free gift from God to us. God chose us through the grace of our baptism and confirmation. We in turn may express our gratitude to God for all the graces received by bearing spiritual fruits in our lives.

What are these spiritual fruits that we are expected to bring forth? They are acts of kindness, generosity and charity, words of loving affirmation, a gentle touch of love for those who need it most, and perhaps spending quality time with our loved ones, especially on this Mother's Day. So, let us express our sincere love and gratitude for our mothers and grandmothers through our loving words and actions towards them, for kindness to one's parents will never be forgotten by God!
