# The Power of the Holy Spirit in our Lives

associate often the Holy Spirit with symbols such as a Dove, Fire, Wind, Water, Cloud (the Glory) and Light, among others. One thing that is common among them, is the sense of a dynamic presence or a force that takes us by surprise and elevates us with inner power, strength and confidence not of our making. It draws us into the beautiful, awesome, and wonderful peace and joy of communion with God, and allows us to respond in faith to do God's will in our lives.

On Pentecost Sunday, we recall that Jesus has promised to send the "Advocate" to be with us even as he ascended to his Father and our Father, to his God and our God. "When the Advocates comes, whom I shall send to you from the Father, the Spirit of truth who issues from the Father; He will be my witness and you too will be witnesses" (Jn 15:26-27)

Jesus is giving us an "Advocate" — the One who represents, who champions, and defends us with our best interests at heart. The Holy Spirt thus is our best Counsel that no money can buy — better than any Senior Counsel or Queen's Counsel!

Indeed, Jesus reassures that he himself will send the Holy Spirit to watch over us. We know that he has not abandoned us, but continues to guide the course of events in the world. It is comforting to know that God is still "keeping an eye on us" and will intervene should things get out of hand. St Thomas Aquinas in his Summa Theologica writings tells us: "All events that take place in the world, whether apparently fortuitous or casual, are comprehended in the order of divine [God's] Providence, on which fate depends."

We may not always comprehend what is going on in the world, when people suffer because of the Covid-19 pandemic, wars, natural disasters, coups, accidents and conflicts. But we also know that God is ultimately allowing them to take their course depending on our cooperation with or lack of it in God's will and plan. Our obedience can change the outcome of history as seen in the response of Mary to bring Jesus into our world incomprehensible as it may be in the beginning to us and to her. "How can this come about since I am a virgin?" (Lk 1:34).

The answer: "The Holy Spirit will come upon you and with power of the Most High will overshadow you" (Lk 1:35). This is the paradigm of the presence of the Holy Spirit in our lives when we are open and receptive to doing God's will in our lives. Mary models this for us

and without exception, we too will experience what she experienced when she said "Yes" in obedience to doing what God had in mind. Our answer of "Yes" or "No" can change the course of history — our fate depends on it as St Thomas tells us.

In other words, we must see ourselves as the continuation of the mission of Jesus by being His witnesses in our lives.

What are we witnessing to? You have seen police signages at accidents or crime locations: "Appeal for Witnesses". They cite the incident and police contact number. They do that to get members of the public to come forward with useful information that will help them in their investigations.

In other words, we are invited to come forward to testify and give a true account of what we have seen and heard so that the truth will emerge and justice be done.

It is clear that Jesus invites us to be empowered by the Holy Spirit, the fire of God's presence in our daily lives to bear witness to him: He calls us to bear witness to three things: 1) To the Truth, 2) To the Loving Presence of God, and 3) To the Glory of God.

The Truth. We live in a world that cast shadows on our path. The strategy of how evil works in our world is simple. Evil distorts, deceives, delays and diverts, and even destroys the truth. Evil will not only try to enslave us, it will try to enslave and destroy us as well. When we are on the side of truth, nothing can touch us

Indeed, we live in our world that is filled with an array of information available on the internet, and the challenge for us today as Christians is to be able to tell the truth from falsehood, light from darkness, and good from evil. For us to know the truth, we need to be discerning, to pray for wisdom, and to live out and practise truth in our own lives as well. We must not even think of compromising truth and negotiate with evil. Truth and goodness are non-negotiable. We can't give what we don't have and practise. If we don't live the truth, we can't practise the truth.

The Loving Presence of God. To have a life in, with and for God is to be aware and mindful of the loving presence of God in our lives. Thomas Merton in his book, The Monastic Journey, captures the message of our Christian living in a simple but profound line: "Our whole of life is our surrender to God's action that makes us love in union with His Spirit." The more we recognise God's action in our lives, the more we learn to let him act in, for and with us. Our job really is to get out of the way. Let us not be an obstacle to his plan of salvation.

The Glory of God. How do we, who are weak and poor, share in the richness, goodness and the glory of God? We glorify God by our lives, by showing our gratitude and praise for all the good that we have received. St Ireaneus puts in succinctly: "The Glory of God is the person fully alive."

To be alive today, we have to be in the world, but not of the world, Fr Teilhard de Chardin, SJ, captures the meaning of being a Christian very clearly when he says: "A Christian is not called to hide behind the shadow of the Cross but be in the fire of Creation." The Holy Spirit is the fire that we must possess and be filled with passion to love our Lord and bear witness to his goodness in our lives. Let us not be afraid to be on fire for the love of God. Only then can we share in the truth, the love and glory of God in our lives.

Let us not be afraid to live as Christians, fully alive and on fire, and be witnesses to the Risen Lord, guiding us through the Advocate, the powerful Holy Spirit constantly at work in our daily lives. I wish all of you a very Happy Pentecost.

Effective 16 May - 13 June 2021 (unless otherwise stated)



## **Mass Capacity**

Mass capacity for all weekend and weekday
Masses will be reduced to **50 pax**.



## **Group Size**

Reduced group size in pew seatings and groups from **5 to 2 people** at any one time.



# **Compulsory TraceTogether**

From 17 May, all parishioners may ONLY use the TraceTogether Token or App to perform SafeEntry Check-ins.



## Weddings

Capacity for Wedding Masses/ Services is capped at **50 pax without pre-event testing** (PET) and at **100 pax with PET** (required for all guests). All attendees, including the couple, are required to be masked up at ALL times.



#### **Funerals & Columbarium**

Capacity for **funeral Masses** will be reduced to **20 pax. All Columbarium visits** are cancelled until further notice.



## **Religious Activities**

All Religious activities (e.g. Infant Baptism and Confessions), face-to-face meetings and sessions are to be **suspended or to be moved online** until further notice.




In view of the tightening of Covid-19 measures, **all Columbarium visits are cancelled** until further notice.

Superior General of the Society of Jesus Fr Arturo Sosa SJ has officially announced the celebration of the Ignatian year to commemorate 500 years since the conversion of St Ignatius — that fateful day when Ignatius the soldier, struck by a cannonball, began his transformation into Ignatius the pilgrim. The Ignatian year begins on May 20, 2021, and concludes on July 31, 2022, the feast of St Ignatius.

The celebration is themed, "To see all things new in Christ" and is an invitation to the whole Society to "'be renewed' by the Lord himself" and "an opportunity to know, to love and to follow the Lord of all things."
