

On Wonder and Our Walk of Faith

ometimes, it's the small things that attract and amaze. At the side of our community house here in Kuching, we have several blue pea flower vines (bunga telang) growing. The pretty blue flowers are very useful in cooking as well as in making a simple tea that's becoming increasingly popular, and so we do harvest the flowers on a regular basis. The plant looks fairly commonplace, growing and climbing on the fence, but its constant inflorescence amazes me. Even if we were to harvest them daily, we would be greeted with a fence filled with little blue flowers every morning, a testament to what we hear in the Gospel this weekend about how we don't know how seeds sprout and grow, but they just do, in God's ways and time.

These things happen to us on a daily basis. We come face to face with the wonders of God, who works mysteriously in our world. The more scientific among us might say, "But all these natural phenomena have scientific explanations and we don't have to remain in the dark as to how they occur." I fully agree with that but trying to give a purely logical or scientific explanation to all the phenomena that we experience

can leave less space for wonder. I feel that the sense of wonder keeps us more open to God and allows us to be more attuned to how God is present in all things.

It is this sense of wonder that I believe St Paul is referring to when he wrote that "we walk by faith, not by sight." We cannot expect to have explanations to everything that we encounter or hope to do, hence the exhortation that we should seek to walk more by faith than by sight, feeling the grace of God in our lives and following this grace as we approach it with awe and wonder. This faith comes with a healthy amount of trust in God, that the grace that we receive is sufficient for us and all we need to do is to keep up the sense of wonder, keep on realising that it's God who wants our good and continues to surprise us on a daily basis.

That's not to say that everything comes up roses (or blue pea flowers, for that matter) all the time. The image of the birds in the trees in both the First Reading and the Gospel has a somewhat ambivalent meaning. It could mean that the plants (both the cedar and mustard bush) give shelter to a range of beings, showing the wide reach of the kingdom of God and how

all are welcome. However, there are negative implications of birds in trees as well. In Scripture, as well as in literature, during the time of the Old Testament, birds can symbolise the raucous and sometimes undesirable elements of society that can distract us from God. We don't want to be distracted from the good things and the wonders of God and so it is good for us to recognise that in our lives of wonder and faith, we have to be aware of such potential distractions, holding them and setting them aside where necessary.

We want to be able to walk by faith and I would add that even though we do walk by faith, we walk with our senses open to everything that's out there. Our sense of wonder adds to our ability to be faithful and trusting as we grow to realise the infinite reach of God's grace and our faith, in turn, helps us become more open and more receptive to the wonder that's already present. And so when we do go out, safely and cautiously of course, we should take that time to smell the roses (or blue pea flowers), giving thanks to God for all that has been, that is, and that will be.
