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The Importance of Gathering Together

ne memorable meal I had was when I was studying overseas and stayed in a Catholic hostel. I made friends from all over the world and one day, a Kenyan friend invited a few of us to a meal at an Ethiopian restaurant. We sat on low chairs around a low table and in the middle was a grand platter that had a huge, spongy flatbread piled high with meat and vegetables. This bread, called injera, is the staple of Ethiopia and is meant to be eaten in a communal meal. It was a glorious meal as the gravy from the meat and vegetables soaked into the bread, allowing the beautiful flavours to merge. But what was better than that was the camaraderie that the meal brought out - us gathering around the bread, sharing it as companions, enjoying each other's company as much as we enjoyed the food. I believe this small experience of communion that can give an insight into what Jesus meant when he said "I am the bread of life".

"I am the living bread that came down from heaven", said the Lord, indicating that he comes not just as bread that provides nourishment for the body, but comes to bring the eternal life that comes from God. Just as the bread, the *injera* that my friends and I ate, did more than just tickle our palates and nourish our bodies, it helped build our friendship. The bread who is Jesus comes not just to assuage our hunger, but to bring us together as the people of God. That is why we gather together at Mass, around the table of the Lord, to pray and to receive the Eucharist, the bread of life that is our salvation. It is also why being at Mass is not just about receiving the Eucharist, but also about the communion that our gathering brings about.

All of us must have felt that this sense of communion took a bit of a hit in this pandemic. However, the truth of Jesus remains and provides a sure source of hope for all of us. While we look forward to the times when we can gather again around the Lord's table as a community, we also realise that we continue to carry the joy and memories of being a community deep within our hearts. This helps us to understand what Jesus, being the living bread from heaven, is all about. No matter how good earthly bread is, we will get hungry again in time. The bread of life, however, is different. Jesus told the disciples that "whoever eats this bread will live forever", reminding us that as we partake of the bread of life, we also partake in life everlasting. And it is this reality, along with our faith in the Lord and hope in the future that enables us to endure

the struggles of not being able to go for Mass in-person as we used to be able to.

It will help us bear with our current situation if we hold fast to the fact that the bread of life is freely given to us as a result of God's providence. Just as the Israelites received manna in the desert and the prophet Elijah was given food to eat as he was fleeing his persecutors, we too are able to receive all that the Lord offers, as long as we are open to that. In a similar way, the relationships that we treasure are also graces that are given to us, privileged spaces where we can encounter companions in our faith journeys. The Lord provides what we need to journey with him towards our salvation and what we have to do is to turn ourselves towards him who is bread and who gives life.

As we celebrate National Day, we also remember how we are called to be this bread to the wider community, lifegiving witnesses of the reality of salvation as we work together with people from all ethnicities, tongues and religions to build a society of love and joy. Blessings this 56th National Day, and may Singapore progress towards a hope-filled future.

60th Jubilee of the Church of St Ignatius

Our Cannonball Moment, Shared & Celebrated

31 July 2020 - 31 July 2021

In August 2019, Fr Colin Tan, SJ, setup the Diamond Jubilee Committee to organise the Church's 60th Anniversary celebrations. With his guidance, the Committee decided to hold a Jubilee Year, focused on two aspects of the Jesuit Universal Apostolic Preferences - to "Walk with the Poor and Excluded", and to "use Ignatian Spirituality and the Ignatian Exercises to show the way to God".

To kick-off our Jubilee, the Committee had planned for a Feast Day Carnival and Mass on 31 July 2020, the Feast of St Ignatius. The first half of our Jubilee would have focused on Ignatian Spirituality, providing opportunities for parishioners to deepen their experience of the Ignatian Exercises. Parishioners would have been sent forth to "Walk with the Poor and Excluded" by committing to 60 hours of outreach and service. Our Jubilee Year would then have rounded off with a Closing Mass and a rousing musical on 31 July, 2021.

foiled due to COVID-19. Initially, it appeared as if a rug was pulled from under our feet. However, drawing parallels to the spiritual awakening and great moment of conversion of St Ignatius, it became clear upon hindsight that the onset of Covid-19 had been our "Cannonball moment". While it appeared that our dreams of grand celebrations were shattered, just like St Ignatius' military ambitions, Christ was guiding us into a deeper and more personal encounter with Him.

✓ Our Jubilee Year

The Jubilee Year began with a small 50-person Mass celebrated by the Apostolic Nuncio to Singapore, Archbishop Marek Zalewski. Concurrently, Fr Colin announced in his feast day message that Pope Francis had imparted his Apostolic blessings and granted our parish a Papal indulgence for the Jubilee Year.

Deeply moved, the Committee along with a group of artistic parishioners set out to build a Door of Grace beautifully adorned



with an adaptation of the Loyola Coat of Arms. The Wolves and Cauldron retell the generosity of the Loyola family, who provided such abundance of food for the Spanish soldiers, that there was always enough leftovers for the wolves to eat.

The Door of Grace serves as a symbol of Christ's mercy and a reminder to live out our call to "Walk with the Poor and Excluded". Philip Prasetio, a parish youth, shared that receiving the Papal Indulgence spurred him towards doing works of devotion, penance and charity. "I practised devotion by spending as much time before the Blessed Sacrament as possible. Penance, by going to confession often, and charity, as I strived to reflect the love of Christ in Spiritfilled conversations, especially with those from different walks of life."



In December 2020, we held a Jubilee Prayerthon - 60 hours Adoration before the Blessed Sacrament. This was welcomed by

many parishioners who appreciated the opportunity to sit with Christ as Adoration Rooms had been closed since mid-February. Over 300 people turned up to spend time with Christ and to pray for the needs of the Church.

Before COVID-19, the Jubilee Committee had adopted Morning Star Community Services (MSCS) as our beneficiary. The intent had been for parishioners to volunteer at MSCS' weekly Care Nights, a four-hour weekday evening support programme for children aged 6 to 14 years. This was replaced by a fundraiser for MSCS which vielded \$87,000, far exceeding our target of \$60,000, truly bearing out the Loyola spirit of generosity.

On 12 February, 2021, Fr Colin unveiled the Jubilee **Commemorative Gallery** – a tribute to the many Jesuits who dedicated their lives to building our Parish.

Vertise the heart of our Jubilee In a video message for our Feast Day on 31 July, 2021, Archbishop William Goh reminded parishioners that "even if we are not able to have a grand physical celebration... if we have a heart of thanksgiving and gratitude to

God, and our forefathers, it will inspire us to walk in their footsteps following St Ignatius – who taught us to give generously, without counting the cost."

The day ended with a Night of Adoration, where parishioners relished the opportunity to rest with the Lord. Alison Pinto, a PPC Exco member, shared that she found herself tearing up with a deep sense of gratitude to be before the Eucharist.

In his closing Jubilee message, Fr Colin said, "The focus of our Diamond Jubilee is not on ourselves, but on how God has blessed us as a Parish community of disciples. For God has planted the seed of faith in us to be able to glorify Him in the church and serve in the Ignatian Spirit to meet the needs of the poor and those affected by the pandemic."

At the heart of Ignatian Spirituality, we are called to embark on a journey of "Finding God in All Things". Looking back, Christ was truly present amidst the uncertainties we faced in celebrating our Diamond jubilee. Through our Cannonball Moment, our Jubilee was transformed into a year of encounter with God's grace, mercy, and love.
