# Learning and Commitment

his weekend, we celebrate **Catholic Education Sunday**. We are grateful for 169 years of Catholic Education in Singapore.

Some of us may know about the Ignatian Pedagogical Paradigm (IPP) which begins with the context in which the learner finds himself. It promotes an individual education. approach to As teachers, we need to understand the world of the student. "Praise, reverence and service" should mark the relationship that exists not only between teachers and students, but among all members of the school community. The IPP focuses on the interplay of experience - reflection - action. For St Ignatius, experience went beyond intellectual grasp since the whole person (mind, heart and will) should enter the learning experience. St Ignatius encouraged the use of imagination, feeling and reason to understand one's lived experiences. He knew himself to be constantly subjected to different stirrings and invitations, alternatives which were often contradictory. He made great efforts to discover what moved him in each situation, what led him to good or to evil inclinations. Based on his exercises, St Ignatius invites us to reflect upon our own experiences in prayer and discern where the Spirit of God is leading us. Reflection matures when it fosters decision and commitment. For St Ignatius, "love is shown in deeds, not in words". In the context of education. action will then focus on strengthening the students' attitudes, values and ideals upon which they would make decisions for the welfare of society. All teachers know the importance of evaluating a student's progress in academic achievement. These reviews and feedback offer opportunities to personalise encouragement and advice on academic improvement for each student.

The IPP framework can be applied to this weekend's Gospel. Christ Jesus, our Lord, began with the context by asking his disciples, "Who do people say I am?" He then asked about his disciples' personal experiences with him, "Who do you say I am?" Peter spoke up, "You are the Christ." Peter acknowledged Jesus as the Messiah, the one sent from God. Jesus then invited his disciples to reflect on who the Christ is and His mission. Jesus also responded to Peter's disagreement by asking his disciples to decide on their personal commitments, "If anyone wants to be a follower of mine, let him renounce himself and take up his cross and follow me." Jesus warned them and us that following in his footsteps will not be easy and will bring suffering and death. We will also struggle to accept failure and imperfection in

others and ourselves. But, Jesus teaches us how to accept his own failure and imperfection by dying on the cross, because He trusted in God who would make him whole.

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Today, we can emulate the disciples in their profession of faith and commitment. In their faith journey, they experienced failure, confusion and darkness, abandoned their Master and despaired the in passion, crucifixion and death of Jesus. However, when they held on to their faith, there was hope and new life, encountering the Risen Christ, experiencing Pentecost, and forming new communities. We also learn that their faith commitment would bring most of the disciples into the same fate as their Master and Lord, proclaiming the Good News and ending their lives as martyrs.

The disciples learnt and discovered the values of their faith commitment in Jesus Christ. With and in Christ, suffering and death are not the last words but eternal life and God's glory are. The Responsorial Psalm sums up this faith commitment and learning that "I will walk in the presence of the Lord, in the land of the living."

How do you evaluate your faith commitment to follow Christ more closely today?
