To celebrate Easter, young men and

To celebrate Easter, young men and women from the DVC youth choir put together a concert titled "Victory Stories" on 22 April. Supported by sponsors including Alpha Singapore, the concert raised close to \$59,000 for the Catholic Foundation's GIFT Fund.

he DVC Youth choir consists of different individuals who are at different points in their journey with God. The one thing we all have in common is the love for song and the heart to serve God's people through song. We are not the perfect choir, but as the bible says in 2 Corinthians, God's grace is sufficient for us. God's power is made perfect in weakness.

The spiritual preparation for the concert was just as, if not more, important than being musically prepared. The one reminder that rang during rehearsals was that "They (the audience) may not be able to tell if you sing imperfectly, but it will be apparent if you sing without heart". Some choir members share their testimonies of that night.

"The concert left me drained physically. Shortly after it ended, my body collapsed. But my heart was full and bursting with joy and peace. I look back at the hectic few months and it has been utterly surreal. I am grateful for this journey, for being given the chance to journey and struggle with this community, for being given the chance to step out of my comfort zone and be pushed to the limits. I am grateful for this journey during Lent and Easter, a journey that I feel I've made with and for God.I am thankful for the people, who have supported me, sang, struggled, cried and laughed alongisde me." - SHAUNE

"Singing during the concert was a new experience for me. I didn't feel any pressure to perform, to look a certain way, to sound a certain way. The whole night was prayer to me. As I stood on the stage, I was free. Free to



sing, free to praise, free to worship, free to celebrate Christ's victory in my life. And as I sang my solo, it was one of the first few times that I actually felt what I was singing was prayer. I wasn't nervous, I wasn't worried, I wasn't scared. The only thing on my mind was to praise God to the best of my abilities, to give my all, my heart, my suffering, my pain, my joys, my triumphs.

Coming out of the concert, I feel a little lost, a little confused as to what this journey means for me in my life. But I pray for the grace to be still and to hear God's voice and his call to me to follow him." – NICHOLAS ONG

"The concert was going to be during a period of great stress, the exam period. The time and effort required wasn't going to alleviate any of that. Yet, somehow, each time I dragged my feet to a choir practice, I was rewarded with a warm comfort and understanding that I am doing what I am doing for Him, and that things will work out because of that. Now that the concert is over, I have no regrets for I know that participating in it was worth it, because HE touched people that night and that's all that matters." – ISABEL

"Even though it was the first concert I've sung in, It's been a mind-boggling adventure with ups and downs. Having said that, our journey wasn't easy going. In preparation for the concert, we had to have multiple meetings, item pickups and packaging sessions. Which meant that we had to have a serious commitment" – JONAH

"I'm actually glad that I tried my best to help with the preparation for the concert. Before the concert I felt that I wasn't pulling my weight in the choir because I really didn't want to try.

What struck me was how much effort everyone put into making it work. Even when I would go to choir not wanting to be there, there was always someone who would say, 'Hey, thank you for coming'. You can go about giving a thousand reasons as to why you would rather be somewhere else rather than in choir, but no one can deny how much love you'd receive unconditionally. I found it very touching that someone would genuinely want to know what's up, sometimes even if they themselves are not in a good place." – **BRANDON**
