Ongoing Conversion

ere in this parish we are well acquainted with the conversion story of Ignatius. Each year we rehearse how a cannonball shattered his leg and his dreams of serving as a knight; how he recuperated for months in pain and boredom; how he then began to notice movements towards good and evil deep in his heart which taught him how to distinguish God's action from movements contrary to the spirit of God. We might be mistaken if we assume that Ignatius' conversion was straightforward. There is an event in this narrative, which challenges the idea that conversion happens once and for all.

In his autobiography, Ignatius relates a moment when he met a Moor (a Muslim) on his pilgrim path. Along the way they talked about religion and argued. Before parting

Sunday 6 August Transfiguration of The Lord ways, the Moor insulted Our Lady, leaving Ignatius angered and confused over what to do. Fired with the zeal of his recent conversion, Ignatius considered riding up to the Moor and killing him. As he plotted vengeance, Ignatius, riding a donkey, came to a crossroad. Unable to decide which road to take nor what to do, Ignatius let the donkey decide. Fortunately, the beast took a path away from the Moor and from bloodshed.

It is remarkable that our patron saint relates this embarrassing event in his life! What could he be inviting us to learn by telling us this story? Firstly, Ignatius is inviting us to note that conversion is a lifelong process. One does not turn to God in one go, but in stages. Our hearts need to be purified over and over again of violence, of pride. Secondly, Ignatius asks us to have the *humility to admit our mistakes* to one another, not to abase ourselves, but in order that others might learn from us. Finally, Ignatius would have us keep God ever in our sight. When we stand at crossroads, desolate and confused, we might learn to trust that God will guide us when we know not what we ought to do.

Making Choices

For most of us, making a choice involves a choosing between right and wrong. We make a choice and then take the first step on the path we have chosen. Another way of choosing is when the choice is made deep within us, like it is second nature. We don't have to see the options or assess the information before we know where to walk or what to do.

In the Gospel, Jesus says, "If any man comes to me without hating his father, mother, wife, children, brothers, sisters, yes and his own life too, he cannot be my disciple. Anyone who does not carry his cross

and come after me cannot be my disciple." It would seem that Jesus' invitation to discipleship is about sacrifice, a sacrifice defined as giving up something of value to us.

If we choose to view sacrifice this way, then eventually we will feel reluctance or see it as something impossible to live up to. Once I was talking to a youth after Mass about joining a community and her response was intriguing. She replied, "I'm not holy enough to join any community." There is a misconception that they have to be holy first and in order to be holy they have to sacrifice the things they really want.

What if we were to change our view of discipleship to one as a way of life, as second nature? In Genesis, God created the world and man to be in perfect union with Him in the Garden of Eden. Perhaps, discipleship is about going back to that perfect union with God. So instead of feeling, "I'm not holy enough to join any community", we should feel, "I'm joining a community so that I may become holy."

This view would make sacrifice more positive – as the act of self-giving that makes life holy. It is the overflow of the fullness that develops from being attuned with Jesus Christ. So the carrying of our crosses is not something bad or painful, but rather something fulfilling and natural.

As St Paul says, "God loves a cheerful giver" (2 Cor 9:7) and I say, "God loves a cheerful disciple."

Mission Prayer: A Pilgrim's Way

As we celebrate the Feast of St Ignatius, we ponder the Ignatian meaning of a pilgrim's journey in the form of our Mission Prayer.

a Mission Prayer? hv When Fr Les took over as Parish Priest last year, he asked the Parish Pastoral Council Exco to consider drafting a Parish Plan (for the next 2 to 3 years) and to discern our pastoral priorities [and parish mission]. Fr Les wanted us to think about what is the narrative, what is the journey we are on. He reminded us that we are a Jesuit church, and St Ignatius was a pilgrim. Indeed, he emphasised that as a parish community, we should all be pilgrims walking together, serving the marginalised, the hungry and the poor, in fellowship. That should be our parish identity. He also reminded us that the parish goal (which is part of Ignatian spirituality) is to find God in ourselves, in others, and in all situations for His greater glory.

After many discussions, Fr Les distilled Exco's thoughts into four Pastoral Priorities: (i) Sacred Liturgy; (ii) Reconciliation; (iii) Communion; and (iv) Social Mission. In the coming months, you will hear more about the four main Pastoral Priorities. With that in mind, he then asked ExCo to try and reduce the Pastoral Priorities into a mission statement, setting out what the Parish aimed to do, and how we intended to achieve it.

However, in what was clearly an inspiration by the Holy Spirit, one of us thought that instead of simply having a mission statement, we should have it as a praver. The reason is obvious – as a prayer, the mission statement can be meditated upon more deliberately and intently, and from which inspiration can be drawn - by the Exco in helping to discern the parish pastoral priorities, by Ministries, NCCs, RCIA/RCIY, and other groups in helping them discern theirs, and in our homes, aiding our discernment of what the Lord is calling us to do. Over several sessions lasting many hours, the Exco (both our priests

and lay members) amended, refined and revised the Mission Prayer, until it was eventually in a form that we thought covered everything that we were attempting to achieve.

At the first Parish Pastoral Council meeting in May, the Mission Prayer was prayed and meditated upon. Comments were provided (and some changes made). The Mission Prayer thus reflects the efforts of both the Exco and the PPC.

I wish to reflect on the verses in the Mission Prayer. The mission prayer reflects our identity. St Ignatius in the Place of Gathering is a pilgrim, searching for God's Kingdom, and with his hand, he shows us the way. And so are all of us – pilgrims, walking the camino of



life. The word camino (Spanish for "way") was deliberately chosen. St Ignatius was Spanish. It reflects the physical pilgrimages (like the Camino de Santiago, or the journey that St Ignatius took from the village of his birthplace, near Azpeitia in the Basque country, to Montserrat and Manresa) and spiritual pilgrimages, we take in our faith journey. As a Jesuit parish, our goal remains the same - to find God in ourselves, in others and, in all situations for His greater glory. We draw strength for our journey from the Sacraments, and the Sacred Liturgy, to which we are called to wholly participate in. Amid wars and strife, both internal and external, we need more than ever, reconciliation - if we have peace and harmony within us, we can become agents of change for others, and all creation. We need to create a parish where everyone is welcome - youth, young adults, the aged, the disabled, migrant workers, the divorced, single parent families, those civilly re-married, and those with same-sex-attractions. As a Jesuit parish, one of our particular charisms is concern for the poor, the marginalized and vulnerable. And we aim to create a loving environment in our parish so that all may be able to encounter Christ deeply and experience ongoing conversion. We are pilgrims on a mission - evangelising by radiating God's love to all who hunger and thirst for Him.

We will be providing more explanations on the verses of the Mission Prayer – look out for it on the parish website.

Do pray the Mission Prayer – in your homes, your Ministries, NCCs and other groups. Choose a word or a phrase that strikes you and meditate on it, and discern what the Lord calls you to do. AMEN.
