as they should are to be treated with dignity and respect and offered every opportunity to seek forgiveness until it is clear they can no longer be a part of the Christian family. The challenge and hallmark of the Christian life is the way in which we live out God's love and forgiveness. And, although the Christian community should be the last group to exclude anyone, even we have to have our boundaries. Sometimes this involves holding others to account for what they say and do, especially if they claim to be a follower of Christ.

The love and forgiveness of God does not mean that "anything goes". It is a love that calls for constant conversion. We can witness to it only to the degree that we have experienced it, from God, from others, and in the way we love and forgive ourselves. And we know when these qualities are taking deep root in us because answering a question like, "What do you really like about yourself?" is a piece of cake!

The Love of Constant Conversion

hen couples who are going to be married in the Church come to see me for the first time I get them to fill out a questionnaire. The last two questions ask: "What do you like best about your partner?" "What do you like best about yourself?"

The first question usually presents no problems, although it can hold a few surprises and sometimes a playful punch if the right answer is not forthcoming! The second question presents all sorts of difficulties. We find it hard to name the God-given qualities we value most in our character. Some couples try to pass it off, "That's for others to say".

The question does cut to the heart of both today's second reading and Gospel. "You must love your neighbour as you love yourself." We cannot say in the same breath, "I hate myself, but I am a good Christian."

For St Paul, love of self was not indulgent, but the cornerstone of our mission to love as Jesus loves us. Paul knew the difference between self-love and self-

adoration. Our love of God is expressed in the healthy and appropriate esteem we have for ourselves. Put another way, we cannot love anyone else if we don't love ourselves. If we have poor self-esteem then often we need others to fill up this gap in our self-love. Most relationships cannot sustain such a demand.

We used to be taught that self-denial were good Christian virtues, and indeed they can be. When properly understood they are never opportunities for selfhatred. The sanest spiritual writers in our tradition saw these virtues as paths of closeness with God and service of our neighbour. St Ignatius Loyola in the Spiritual Exercises saw that it was precisely as sinners that God loves us. He saw that one of the greatest gifts the Lord can give us is when we see our sinfulness for what it is, but are not overwhelmed by it, and that we experience the power of God's love for us who calls us to walk as children of the light.

Jesus in today's Gospel teaches us that those who do not love their neighbour

My Neighbour, My Friend

If I have a row or disagreement with my neighbor, how do I put it right? How do I remedy this? How do I make up with my neighbor to whom I am not on speaking terms? Does gospel help?

Jesus is inviting us to practice, to forgive and accept. So how do we do it? Does the gospel answer your question? You need to show that the gospel works. If we want to get to its root, we must dig our way, question by question. Forgiveness on earth, recognized in heaven. If you wish to obey Christ, you must first free yourself of all "righteous"

anger. This will not be easy. And will never be.

Accept and acknowledge that we are not composed of goodness and sinfulness. We must see others as children of God, who are full of weakness. Must we live up to find our true selves as the child of God?

Perhaps it will be easier if we write about love of neighbor. Forgive in love, and such love becomes pardon when that neighbor trespasses against us, as we trespass against God.

Our parish community will be celebrating the Combined Rite of Acceptance of Inquirers into the Order of Catechumens and of Welcoming of Candidates for Confirmation and Reception into the Full Communion of the Catholic Church.

baptism, one God, the Father of all.

The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults (RCIA) is one rite divided into various periods that respect the individual's journey of faith. Community celebrations that serve as transitions or steps throughout the rite mark these periods of initiation formation.

here is one Lord, one faith, one

The periods of the RCIA and their accompanying transition celebrations are as follows:

- Period of Evangelization and the Precatechumenate
- Rite of Acceptance into the Order of Catechumens and the Rite of Welcoming
- Period of the Catechumenate
- Rite of Election
- Period of Purification and Enlightenment
- Celebration of the Sacraments of Initiation
- Period of Mystagogy

These various periods are a process of formation to the gospel. The RCIA helps facilitate the experience of God for those seeking full initiation into the community. This formation to the gospel becomes the seed for renewal in the parish community not only because new members come into community, but because the actual formation team for the RCIA is the parish community.

The rite of acceptance into the order of catechumens is the first of the

public rites celebrated in the Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults. During this important ritual, the inquirers publicly declare their intention to continue their journey toward

full initiation into the Catholic church, and the community accepts them, offering its support and witness during the journey. In rather vague and broad language, the ritual text defines what is required for an inquirer to make this first step: the beginnings of the spiritual life and the fundamentals of Christian teaching have taken root. We celebrate the rite at various times during the year depending on need and local conditions. One of the significant "local conditions" is the liturgical year as celebrated in the community. (Typically,) we celebrate this rite outside the major liturgical seasons of the Church calendar. (The ritual text) highlights the importance of the baptised community in the celebration of this rite, and the various ministries appropriate to its celebration.... Considering this and everything else said about the central role of the liturgical assembly, we celebrate this rite at the Sunday Eucharist. The ritual text reminds pastoral leadership to include the names of the new catechumens and their sponsors, along with the information about the rite (date, presiding minister) in the registry of catechumens, as directed in... the Code of Canon Law. This book should be kept in a secure place, along with other registries such as the baptismal registry. (The ritual text also) reminds us that (once they have celebrated the rite) catechumens are now members of the Church, although not fully initiated members. Therefore, they should be actively involved in the liturgical prayer of the Church.... If a catechumen marries before full initiation, the appropriate rites from the order of celebrating Christian

marriage are used. Similarly, if a catechumen dies, he or she is to be considered a member of the Christian faithful.... Following the principle that we experience liturgy first, and then reflect on

the experience to discover new meanings, the major movements and experiences of the rite become the content of the

ensuing catechesis. There will be many feelings present for the catechumens. (They should be given) an opportunity to talk about the experience, and their hopes and desires.

The significant difference (between the rite of welcoming of the candidates for confirmation and full communion and) the rite of acceptance is the recognition that these candidates are, indeed, baptised and nothing is to be done to suggest otherwise.... The ritual structure of the combined rite attempts to integrate the two aforementioned rites while maintaining the important distinction between the catechumens and the baptised candidates.... The primary way this is done is by first addressing the catechumens and then, when there is a parallel moment in the rite, addressing the candidates.

The rite of acceptance and the rite of welcome are the formal entry points into the period of the catechumenate. During this prolonged period of formation, the catechumens and candidates will have the opportunity to be opened to the mystery of God's presence in their lives and in the Christian community. Through catechetical, liturgical, spiritual and apostolic formation, the candidates and catechumens, along with their sponsors, team, and the community as a whole, journey in faith, discerning God's call to authentic life and discipleship. This first ritual step will provide a firm foundation upon which we can build this formation process.
