Sunday 21 January Third Sunday of Ordinary Time Have you ever had to jump out of the way on the pavement because a cyclist or scooter rider is charging towards you at great speed? Their lack of awareness comes at the expense of the wellbeing of others. Their apparent callousness may even be dangerous. Public spaces are meant to be shared and negotiated in a polite manner. To behave otherwise is to place oneself above the greater good, and not behaving as a good neighbour.

Reflecting on God's "self-emptying" love, Cardinal Walter Kasper, in his book Mercy: The Essence of the Gospel and the Key to Christian Life, writes: "This kenosis (selfemptying) of God is the presupposition for the fact that God, who is infinite, can make room for creation." His point is that God loves us so much, that He "steps aside" and makes room for us to exist and to encounter Him in freedom. Indeed, if God's love is conveyed through "self-emptying" and by making room for the other, then shouldn't we respond in kind? We are caught up with responsibilities at work, errands to run, and the many other form of distractions. Instead of allowing these things to dominate our lives, shouldn't we find space in our hectic schedule and in our hearts to pray and commune with the Lord? It is precisely because our lives are swamped with activities that we need to intentionally make room for God.

One crucial aspect of our faith life is its social dimension. Human beings do not live alone, but in community. It is in the greater community that humans flourish. Jesus has reminded that as Christians, we are called to love God, and to express it through loving our neighbours. (Matthew 22:37-40, Mark 12:28-31, Luke 10:27) These two dimensions are inextricably linked. Just as we hope to make room in our hearts to encounter the

This Sunday 14 January is 104th World Day of Migrants and Refugees. In response to Pope Francis' call for each one of us to act, the Jesuit Refugee Service (JRS) is launching a campaign called #Do1Thing. This campaign shows what ordinary people are doing to welcome, protect, promote, and integrate refugees in their communities. #Do1Thing features five videos, each of a single volunteer's simple act of offering friendship, or helping with a language class, one form of support, one day in a week.

Pope Francis says that if you can bring hope to one person, "then there will be another 'you', and another 'you', and it turns into an 'us'...when there is an 'us', there begins a revolution" — a revolution of compassion and tenderness.

Lord and nourish our spiritual lives, so too should we strive to make room for others. At the minimum, this entails showing concern for their welfare. Making room for others is a manifestation of humility, acknowledging one's dependence on God. By making space for God in our hearts, we too are able to see beyond our own needs, move aside and care for others; and by showing our concern for greater good, we too can develop a more generous heart to encounter God.

Communing with God

Kingsmead Centre for Ignatian Spirituality and Counselling. That's quite a mouthful, but It is a name that accurately reflects what we at the Centre do.

So what is Kingsmead Centre again? Kingsmead Centre is one of the primary apostolates of the Jesuits in Singapore, and is located at 8 Victoria Park Road, behind the Church of St Ignatius. The site we are at was once a students' hostel, before it became what it is today in 1990 (that explains the 30 single rooms!). Kingsmead Centre offers various programmes such as retreats, workshops and talks on Ignatian spirituality and psycho-spiritual wellness, in addition to Spiritual Direction and Counselling services.

What's Spiritual Direction? Spiritual direction focuses on your prayer life and spiritual questions – your deep longings, sacred experiences, and your response to what is holy and meaningful in your life journey. These are the things your spiritual director will help you to unravel, so as to grow in your relationship with God.

Meet-ups tend to be monthly, so that the time together is a gentle "check-in" around experiences that have either drawn you closer to God or felt more like obstacles on your path. These sessions generally are for around 45 minutes.

Who are the Spiritual Directors and Counsellors? Are they priests? Our Spiritual Direction and Counselling teams comprise the Jesuit team and laypersons, who are trained in the spiritual direction and counselling. All of them have the relevant qualifications and experience to help you.

Are there any fees or contributions involved?

Yes, there are. We suggest a contribution of \$30 per session for spiritual direction, and \$80 per session for counselling. These stipends go to the spiritual directors and counsellors. That said, we welcome all who need these services; we do not turn anyone away because of financial reasons.

What about retreats? How do these work? We welcome individuals to make retreats just about anytime in the year, subject to availability (we have group bookings or programmes organised on some days). Retreats at our Centre are in the Ignatian style, so it's meant to be silent, save for when a retreatant meets his/her spiritual director.

We also have "programmed retreats", which are basically retreats that we organise and have a facilitator to lead. Some have input sessions and are more semi-silent in nature.

Won't I get bored in the silence?! Maybe, but our hope is that every retreatant is able to befriend the silence, and by disconnecting from all the noise of the world, he/she is able to listen to himself/herself and God better.

We often hear retreatants saying that this communing or "holidaying" with God is very restful. You can go for walks too, whether around the estate or to the Botanic Gardens.


What about food? Will I eat well? (this is one of the most asked questions) Simple meals are provided for retreats. We don't promise degustation menus or elaborate meals. We do have a pantry stocked with snacks (eg biscuits, cereal), fruits, instant noodles and various instant drinks.

Most importantly, we hope you will be nourished by God spiritually. (Our vision is to be a living spiritual spring for all seeking the love of God.)
