

Recognising Christ

t is always exciting when we begin something new. I observed this as my niece and nephew began Primary 1 last week. When I met them, I asked how was their first day of school? They were struggling to find words to answer, so I changed my question, "Did you meet a new friend, and what is his/her name?"

Giving a name or a word helps us

recognize and become aware of our personal experience. At beginning of this year, after the Solemnity of Mary, Mother of God, we celebrated the Most Holy Name of Jesus on January 3, which is also the Titular Feast of the Society of Jesus.

Ignatius of Loyola and his Ordinary Time invites us to deepen our encounter and friendship with Jesus Christ, our brother, Lord and Saviour. The colour green for Ordinary Time signifies "a time of growth", when we receive the Life of God and deepen it every time we celebrate liturgy - "the mystery of Christ itself is honoured in its fullness, especially on Sundays.

celebrated the feast of Baptism of the Lord, which marks the end of Christmas season. Our parish also celebrated infant baptism, which takes place every second Sunday of the month throughout the year. We choose a baptismal name of a saint or of an expression of a Christian mystery or virtue (CCC 2156, 2165). The patron saint can become the good model of the newly baptized to strive living his/ her Christian faith. Choosing a baptismal name helps us recognise a new life and reality in Christ, in which the baptized is completely transformed into God's beloved child.

John the Baptist recognises Jesus as the "Lamb of God". This name signifies Jesus' mission as the One who redeems us from our sins. It also recalls the blood of the Passover lamb that liberates the Israelites from the slavery in Egypt. John tells us that Jesus will offer up his selfsacrificial love and life on the cross for us and the world.

So many of us see the year 2016 as the year of disruption. God also disrupts or awakens us for "a change to become a more responsible and mature person". Perhaps, we can recognise this change to grow as Christ's disciples today. As we begin Ordinary Time, let us examine our relationship with Jesus Christ. Who is Jesus to me? What name do I give that best expresses my living encounter with Christ?

This little Light

"There goes the lamb of God who takes away the sins of the world" such a startling revelation. What is sin today and who is really going to do anything about it? Is it violence, drug abuse and its consequences, irresponsible sex, abuse of the young, polluting and devastating our planet, rampant injustice which cannot live with love? Or is it found inside myself - not somewhere out there - in my confusion, bewilderment, insensitivity to the Divine? However we see it, sin is way beyond our control. Yet we insist that life and its progress are all about what glorifies man's pathetic efforts - spectacular and ineffective. To depict the saviour of it all as a "lamb" humiliates us in our manhood and annoyingly pricks our pride.

See it how we will, today's scenario is confused, dark and bewildering. Yet we are the "light of the nations". In my Christian faith I know that I have personally a part to play in the redemption of mankind. Must I suffer the indignity of being termed a "lamb" before I bring about my tiny effectiveness? And what is it that is mine to contribute?

A lamb is submissive and is not particularly interested in its personal effectiveness. It knows that it is in the hands of one who can protect and manage and is therefore

love receiving gifts. I think most people do. My expectations aren't very high these days, so I was pleasantly surprised with all the gifts I received this past Christmas. Even though this was probably the least I have received at Christmas so far.

But no, I'm not indulging in a pity party with the sneaky motive of asking for more gifts. Like I said, I enjoyed the presents I got. Every one of them. Even the lovely blue loofah!

So what's the point of me saving all this? Well, I noticed over Christmas that gifts are not always received in the way the giver has meant or hoped. I'm not saying I witnessed instances of individuals unwrapping gifts, making a face, thereby leaving the giver upset (imagine that!). Instead, I witnessed a few individuals unwrapping their gifts (thankfully not in the giver's presence), and judging the gifts and the giver. By saying, "Oh that must have been on offer", "I'm sure this is a

re-gift", or "Is he trying to tell me something?".

At first I found these observations and inferences amusing. After a while it started to bother me. While I suspected that there was some truth to those remarks, I still wondered why the gifts weren't being received with openness and love. As if each one of them were truly from the giver's heart, a worthy sacrifice. I guess that's why people say, "It's the thought that counts".

As I reflected a bit more (this turned out to be my post-Christmas meditation fodder), I realised that I'm guilty of the above too. I know that I take many gifts in my life for granted. I simply take, oftentimes with little or no thought given as to the sacrifice or the heart of its source. And if all things come from God, the divine source, then perhaps I have not received from God in a way that He wants me to as well.

So here's a thought: at Christmas, with all the giving and receiving, did we receive the greatest gift of them all in a way the Father meant us to? That was rhetorical, of course. Besides, Jesus is given every day to us, and this will take our lifetime to fully receive. The good thing is though, we have our liturgy to help. It's structured in such a way that we are invited to constantly appreciate the gift that is Jesus, not just at Advent, but through Lent and ordinary time too.

So let's try and make that our focus every day this year, (I know I will) to receive fully from God all the love and blessings, and Jesus especially. And to just delight in these gifts. And delight in Him, too.

His love is always on offer, and His love when received makes us want to share or re-gift it. After all, He is always trying to reveal to us His character through His love.

Ah, looks like I know what will keep my mind busy as I scrub my skinny self in the shower this year with my lovely blue loofah.

As the first big gift he feels like he's received this year, Keith wanted to share the love. Inspiration came while showering. True story. The Spirit works in mysterious ways.
