# Not the Head, But the Heart

ou have been warned: clear out of church and carpark immediately after the noon mass this Sunday, to make way for a 900-strong crowd who will be descending upon our hallowed ground on King's Road! Congestions, of humans and cars, are anticipated for the Rite of Election (RoE), which begets the question: "What is the RoE?"

In the liturgical celebration of the RoE, the Church publicly and formally declares that catechumens, or the unbaptized aspiring to be Catholics, as people who have been called and chosen to receive the Sacraments of Initiation, namely Baptism, Confirmation and the Eucharist, at the Easter Vigil. After the RoE, they will no longer be called catechumens but elects, reflecting the fact that they are God's chosen, and one step closer to the "door of the Church." It also marks the beginning of the period of "Enlightenment and Purification," coinciding with Lent, in which the elects are expected to deepen their faith and resolution to become Catholics. In the same celebration, the Christians from other traditions who are seeking full communion with the Catholic Church, are given due recognition and publicly called to continuing conversion as they journey steadily towards Easter.

The RoE also serves as a milestone in the greater process of initiation for those seeking life in the Catholic Church – the Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults (RCIA). The rite may be adaptable for youths (RCIY) and even older children (RCIC). Gone are the days when the usual route to baptism was simply receiving a few short weeks of individual catechetical instructions. Other than for infants, young children, and in cases of emergency, the Church now normatively requires one desiring to be Catholic to undergo an extended period of formation and gradu-

al initiation, and usually in the company of others who share the same aspiration.

The RCIA is by no means an entirely "new invention". Rather, it has "restored, revived, adapted and renewed" many elements and practices from the initiation process in the early Church. It is the fruit of the spirit of resourcement and aggiornamento – the Second Vatican Council's call to revisit the Church's rich history in order to appropriate things that are helpful for the Church's mission

# For the Glory of God

today. According to the third century document, The Apostolic Tradition of Hippolytus of Rome, those seeking baptism then had to be examined by the Church, gain their sponsors' endorsement of their worthiness, and "hear the Word" for a three-year period, before they can receive baptism. These elements are also found in modern RCIA programs.

While catechesis remains important part of the RCIA, it should rightly be considered a process through which one gradually immerses into the mysteries of the Christian faith. Thus, the RCIA does not aim to "teach the faith" so to speak, but facilitates faith experiences and the deepening of these experiences through reflection and prayer, with the hope of helping inquirers, catechumens and candidates to discern their call and strengthen their commitment. It is not a educational program that merely transmits "head knowledge", but a "journey of the heart", in which the person involved gazes deeper into himself and his life experiences to encounter the heart of Christian faith - the person of Jesus. When Jesus asked his disciples, "Who do you say I am," (Mt. 16:15) he was not seeking an answer based on logical deductions or scientific investigation, but knowledge that is founded on faith.

As we petition the Lord to continue to bless our catechumens and candidates as they journey towards Easter Vigil, we also pray for ourselves asking the Lord for similar graces: that our Lenten observances are not merely done out of routine or to gain "head knowledge", but help us, as members of the Church, to be more united with Jesus.

here are many reasons why Victor Hugo's Les Miserables remains one of the most beloved musicals. One is the richness of characters and the meaning the audience can draw from it.

The protagonist, Jean Valjean, is a small-time thief who was jailed for 19 years for stealing a loaf of bread to feed his sister's starving child. Hardened by his time in jail, he does not hesitate to steal from the kindly bishop who has offered him warm shelter and food. The kind Bishop, who not only forgives but also defends him, touches his heart and stirs his conscience. Valjean, breaking parole, repents and turns his life around to become someone who is willing to risk his life to save others, strangers and enemies alike. A heart of stone that turns into flesh.

Inspector Javert, a self-righteous policeman bent on carrying the law, pursues Valjean relentlessly. When Valjean spares his life, Javert is unable to reconcile the conflicts in his heart: being saved by someone whom he perceives to be a sinful criminal. He condemns

himself by committing suicide; a tragic end, as he does not allow himself to be loved and to receive mercy. A heart of stone that refuses to transform.

Valjean and Javert are the contemporaries of Moses and Pharaoh. Indeed, history is filled with narratives of the two opposites of humanity, from ancient times and for as long as civilization will continue. Some souls, like Moses and Valjean, encounter God and God's mercy and become fully alive - humbled, saved and set free, transforming into a channel of God's grace for others. Others, like Pharaoh and Javert, encounter God and vet choose to harden their hearts - souls condemned by their pride and unwillingness to receive and to extend mercy.

Our stories may not be as dramatic as theirs. Nevertheless, when we look back at the episodes in our life, we would notice that there were times when we allowed ourselves to love and be vulnerable, to have a bleeding heart, when we allowed joy and sorrow in our lives. And there were days when we turned our heart into stone, building a fence to protect ourselves

from being hurt, risking nothing and gaining nothing. We alternate our heart between flesh and stone. We are both.

Indeed, life presents us with so many decisions, and every choice we make either soften or harden our heart. The Scripture often reminds us of the importance of the heart: the word "heart" is cited more frequently than the word "love." It truly is the centre of our being and the source of our actions.

The Lenten season is the perfect time to withdraw and consciously pay attention to the movements in our heart. It is an invitation to reflect on the time when we experienced love and mercy that touched us deeply, and of simple gestures of kindness extended to us by loved ones or strangers. When we loved generously and unconditionally, or when we "loved" with strings attached. When we refused to forgive or snubbed someone who extended an olive branch. When we were indifferent.

Perhaps we let the memories stir our heart. And bring them in our prayers, allowing gratitude to wash us clean and enliven us, and regrets and wounds to heal. The Lord assures us in Ezekiel 36:26, "I will give you a new heart and put a new spirit within you; I will take the heart of stone out of your flesh and give you a heart of flesh." The hurt we carry and the hurt we cause, we ask Him to mend them all. And we let His warmth melt the ice in our heart.

Joseph Campbell writes "what we hold in our hearts define what we have in our lives." May Lent remind us to be more attentive to the movements in our heart, choosing the heart of flesh even when it is difficult to do so. Especially when it is difficult to do so.
